Wheat and other grains shot higher with oats, wheat equaling this season's best previous figures. Illinois, Iowa and other hig growers of oats reported sensationally severe crop damage from recent abnormal temperatures. In addition, there was a return of intense heat today southwest, threatening further wide-spread havoc to farm pro-

ducts. All grains closed strong, wheat and oats 1 1/4-2 1/4 above yesterday's finish, corn 1 % -2 cents up. Today's closing quotations:

Wheat: July 75 14 - 34: September 77-774; December 794-4. Corn: July 45%-%; September 481/2-%; December 51%-1/2. Oats-July 27%-%; September 28 3/4-29; December 30 1/2-5/8.
