WHEAT, OATS SOAR ABOVE 1931-32 WEATHER AGAINST BERRY QUALITY

Report of Destruction Of Much Wheat is Buying Impetus

CHICAGO, June 10 - (AP) -Swift soaring of prices took wheat and oats today to above any peaks which future deliveries have heretofore reached since

A big renewal of public speculative buying followed official reports that indicated 36,500,000 bushels' destruction of winter wheat in the past 30 days, with spring wheat now facing its critical period and showing a conditon below a 10-year average. Giving brisk further impetus to buyers were advices of widespread intense heat today causing wheat firing in Illinois and the Ohio valley, areas that up to this time have been regarded as in the best condition of any in the United States.

Despite huge selling to take profits, wheat closed strong at virtually the day's top point, 14above yesterday's finish, oats -1 % up corn 1/8 - 1/2 advanced. Today's closing quotations:
