A brief sketch of Flag day indicates that Dr. B. J. Cigrand of Batavia, Ill., was the organizer of the society called the National Flag Day association and that this society was responsible for the adoption of June 14 as national flag day.

The purpose of the day as stated by this group is to "promote ideas of peaceful rather than militant patriotism." Dr. Cigrand, it has been established since his death last summer, was perhaps one of the greatest authorities on seals and heraldry. He designed the seal of Chicago and Cook county.

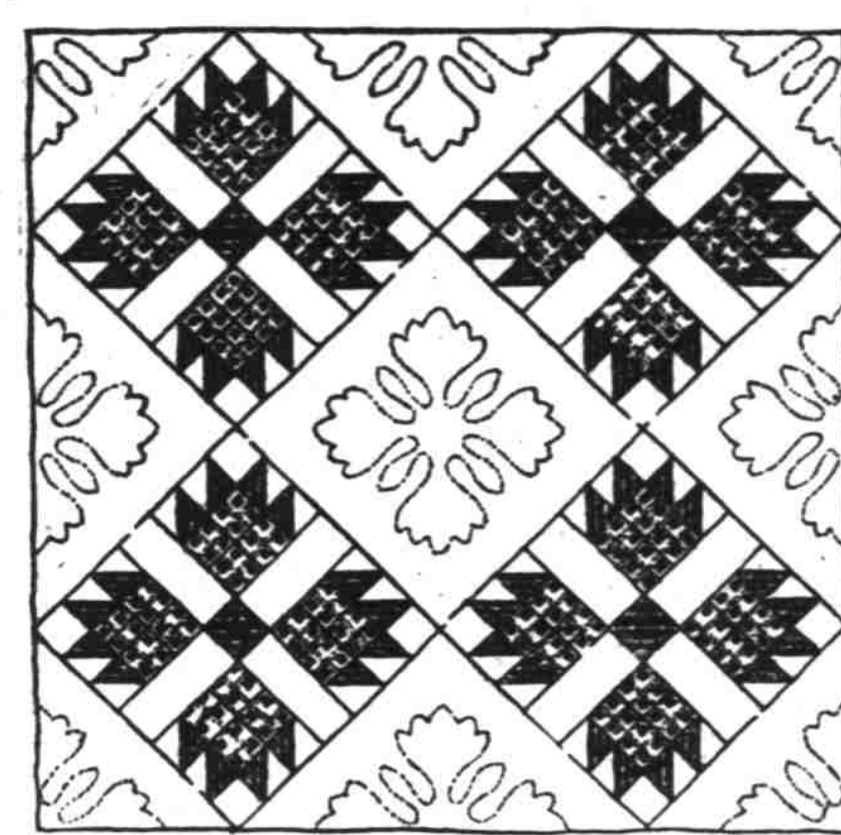
The marriage will take place in Portland. A number of Salem people will attend.

PATCHWORK QUILT PATTERN



Bear's Paw No. 452. Quilting Motif No. 453

The quiltmaker of pioneer days incorporated the events and the sights of her daily life in her quilt designs. What with bears a familiar sight all over the country at that time, it was no wonder that all sections produced a Bear's Paw quilt.

The bear's clumsy paws can easily be distinguished in this pattern which is so easily made and so decorative when finished.

The pattern comes to you with complete simple instructions for cutting, sewing and finishing, together with yardage chart, diagram of quilt to help arrange the blocks for single and double bed size, and a diagram of block which serves as a guide for placing the patches and suggests contrasting materials. Price of pattern, 10c.

The Bear's Paw is shown combined with a quilting pattern which repeats the bear's paw in curved lines. It not only harmonizes well with this pattern but it effective when used with other patchwork designs. The motif is 7 1/2 inches square. Six of these motifs as well as six half motifs for the border are offered you in a transfer pattern.
