Fifteen Million Federal Highway Aid is Possible

PORTLAND, June 15 — (15) — R. H. Ballock, state highway engineer, expressed the belief in addressing the educational committee of the Portland chamber of commerce here that Oregon may receive as much as \$15,000,000 for highways from the federal government under the public works bill, of which \$12,800,000 would be a direct grant.

Among the reconstruction projects he said might be undertaken with the funds are the Canby, Salem and Salem-Albany sections of the Pacific highway. Gaps would be completed on other highways, including the South Santiam and Willamette routes.

Issuance of Auto Licenses Starts, 500 Got Out Here
