Low Fares Effective—With dollar day fares in effect over the Fourth of July for the first time, the Southern Pacific company yesterday announced plans for extensive travel in connection with the national holiday this year. The low-fare program, featuring cent-a-mile transportation, will embrace the five-day period June 30 to July 4, with return limit of July 11, according to A. F. North, agent for the company here. All stations on the railroad's lines, in the territory from San Francisco to Salt Lake City, and from Portland to El Paso are to be included in the holiday offer, it was stated.

MERIT RATING PLAN OPERATIVE JULY 1

The new merit rating system, adopted recently by the state industrial accident commission, will become operative July 1, members of the commission announced Saturday.

Under the new system contributors to the workmen's compensation act will receive substantial credits based on elimination of accidents. Contributors who report an increase in accidents will be penalized. Otto Hartwig, member of the commission, declared that the new merit rating system had been tried out in a number of western states and had proved successful. Such a law has been in operation in California for several years.

Although some of the rates under the workmen's compensation act have been increased slightly for the year beginning July 1, reductions were said to have decreased. This situation was reported to have been due to a revival of the lumber industry and the resultant resumption of a number of mills and logging camps. In a few cases the rates were reduced, Hartwig declared. "Our records show that business conditions are improving," Hartwig said, "and we have received many new contributors."

Gram, state labor commissioner.

Search is Shifted—Search for William Young, 28, missing Portland aviator, Monday shifted from the vicinity of Detroit to McMinville and Wilhoit Springs, Lee Eyerly, local airport manager, is assisting in the search. A report was received here late Sunday that a woman had heard an airplane apparently in distress in the Wilhoit Springs district earlier in the day. Aviators previously had spent several hours searching for the missing plane in the mountain sections 50 miles east of Salem.

Seeks Suit Money—Anita Snelgrove, defendant in a divorce action recently brought by Max Snelgrove, yesterday filed a motion for suit money and attorney's fees in circuit court here. She asks \$140 be allowed her during the pendency of the litigation. Defendant claims the complaint of the plaintiff is false and asserts she took the shirt from her husband in resisting him in order to "avoid a terrible beating."

J. SEDMAN SPEAKS AT SCIENCE CHURCH

"Science of Indestructible Good" is Subject of Sunday Lecture

John Ellis Sedman, C.S., of Los Angeles, member of the board of lectureship of the Mother church, First Church of Christ, Scientist, gave a lecture at the Salem Christian Science church Sunday night on "Christian Science: The Science of Indestructible Good."

The lecturer said in part: "Christian Science is a subject of such vast proportions that it cannot be dealt with in a comprehensive way in a brief address. At this time I desire to call your attention especially to that aspect of Christian Science which makes plain the indestructible nature of good. When we look out over the world, and mark the problems which confront humanity, we can easily see that no teaching can lift the burdens from the shoulders of men unless it can make plain the fact that the discords and distresses of the race have no foundation in God's infinite plan. All the fears which beset humanity can be traced to the prevailing belief that evil is real and that good can be destroyed. People fear concerning health, because they believe that health can be impaired, diminished, destroyed. When happy, they fear lest happiness be displaced by sorrow. People fear for their families, because they believe that mind can be injured. They fear concerning their friendships, because they believe that friendship is something which begins and consequently may end. People fear concerning their supply of necessary things, because they believe that supply may be curtailed or entirely cut off. Men fear that they may be displaced, and no longer have good and useful positions to fill. They fear even for life itself, because they believe life to be destructible. Christian Science comes putting to rest all such fears with the comforting assurance that good is, always has been, and ever will be indestructible. There is no such thing as destructible or perishable good. Our concepts of good may change, but the good itself remains forever the same immutable, imperishable good."

What is good? We can give a simple and yet profound answer to that question in one word, God. God is good, infinite, ever-present, indestructible good, existing at the standpoint of causation. God's creation is good, infinite, eternal, indestructible good, existing at the standpoint of effect, forever produced and forever sustained by God. All Christian thinkers agree with the inspired teaching of the Bible that God is the one and only cause and creator. God is admittedly eternal, infinite, and perfect. Obviously then, God can have within Himself no destructive element. Now, like produces like; that simple proposition bases all true logic. It follows that since there is no destructive element in God, there can be no destructive element in that which God creates. Hence, the demonstrable fact that everything that God produces is as eternal and indestructible as God Himself.

Everyone agrees that good and evil are opposites. Honesty and dishonesty are opposites. Love and hate, holiness and unhappiness, sickness and health, happiness and unhappiness, harmony and discord are opposites. Mrs. Eddy was led by God to see that since good and evil are opposites, only one of them can be real. She saw that since the perfect God obviously produces the real good, then evil, the opposite of good, cannot come from God and must be unreal. No one has ever been able to explain how a perfect God could create evil; and no one has ever been able to explain how evil can exist as a reality if God is perfect and omnipotent. Christian Science takes its stand squarely on this proposition and teaches that the perfect and omnipotent God cannot, and does not, produce evil of any sort, and that consequently evil is the, which may be supposed to exist, but which actually has no existence. Then Christian Science proceeds to make good its irresistible logic on this point by irrefutable proof. Centuries ago Jesus taught and demonstrated the unreality of evil. He taught and proved that sin,

Children of Salem should have no trouble finding something for amusement this summer now that both summer playgrounds for children have opened. The Lincoln playground opened yesterday under the leadership of Margaret Nelson, and the one at Olinger field has been going for nearly a week in charge of R. R. Boardman, with Mildred Miller and Esther Arnold assisting.

One hundred and fifty children attended the first day's activities at Lincoln. All of the last year's equipment there is in place and some new features are being added. Among these are a tennis court, shuffleboard equipment and balancing bars. Practice was begun yesterday on stunts for which points will be awarded later, and three baseball teams were organized. Later in the season regular games will be played between teams representing the two playground groups.

Mrs. Nelson announced last night that the story hour at Lincoln will be at 3 p. m. daily. She stated that many children came to the playground for this feature alone. Activities begin at 1 p. m. and end at 6 o'clock each day.

The report from Olinger field yesterday stated that dozens of boys and girls enjoyed a new pastime; that of riding a mule. According to the report the only drawback in this amusement was that the mule, a one-eyed animal owned by Henry Street, could carry only six youngsters at a time due to the razorlike contours of his back.

The city dredge is busy at cleaning out and deepening the swimming pool at Olinger and this will be ready for use in a short time. The giant stride was put up yesterday and proved a popular form of amusement, while soccer, baseball and volleyball kept the boys in continual good humor.

Major events listed at Olinger for the week are a track meet for boys and girls on Wednesday and swimming meet and badge tests on Friday. All in all there is plenty to keep all of the children and the three leaders busy all of the time.

MOLALLA PROTESTS JULY 4 RODEO HERE

Officers of the Molalla Buckeroo association were statehouse visitors Monday to protest the July 2, 3 and 4 celebration scheduled for the fairgrounds, which coincides with the 101st annual buckaroo at their town.

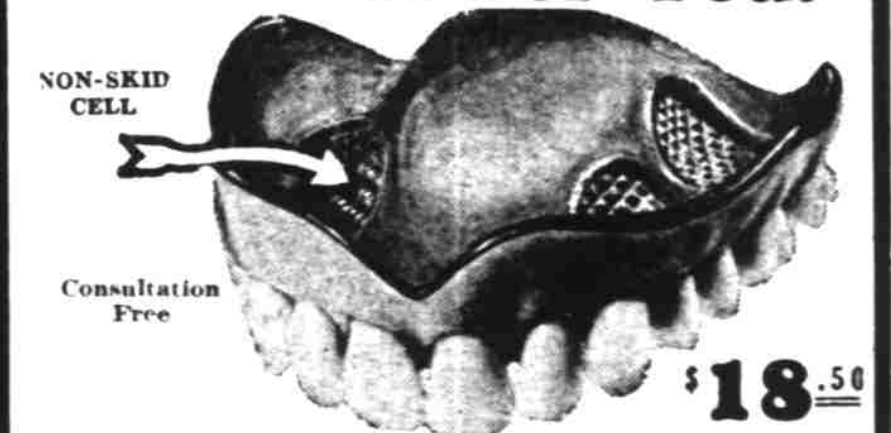
The Molalla delegation contends that the fairgrounds even staged under direction of Mr. Gehlhar places the state in direct competition with its communities and that "such action by the director of agriculture departs from the fine traditions established by the Oregon state fair as an agricultural, mechanical and education exhibit" in that it puts the state fairgrounds in the business of carnival promotion.

The group, headed by F. M. Henriksen, president of the Buckeroo association, filed resolutions of protest at the governor's office. Attempts to confer with Max Gehlhar on the matter were unsuccessful and a prearranged conference with the governor did not materialize.

Besides Henriksen, in the Molalla group were Gilbert W. Harris, W. J. Avison, E. R. Wallace and George Case.

A second factor displeasing the buckeroo management is that both the buckeroo and the celebration staged at the fairgrounds are advertising Ed Wright as in charge of the show events.
