Gehlhar Says Buckeroo Feature of July 2-4 Stampede cut out

Difficulties between Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture and the management of the Molalla Buckeroo, seemed on the way to solution late yesterday when Gehlhar announced that all buckeroo features would be eliminated from the stampede program he plans for the state fairgrounds July 4. Later Molalla citizens stated over the telephone that they would not object to any show held here under the direction of the American legion, provided rodeo features were eliminated.

Win Large Contract—The largest lubricating oil contract ever awarded on the Pacific coast has been granted by the United States navy to the Standard Oil company of California. Officials of that company announced Tuesday. The award includes entire requirements for the navy at Pacific coast ports, including Alaska and Hawaii. In the provisions of the contract is an order for 1,300,000 gallons of lubricating oils.

 FORT STEVENS, June 20 — (Special to The Statesman)—Sub-caliber firing was finished Monday when Battery A fired its last practice shots from Battery Clark. All of the other batteries finished sub-caliber Friday afternoon. The marksmanship has been exceptionally good this year.

Service firing began Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock when Battery A fired its first shell from the Battery Clark mortars. Following A, Batteries C and D fired their 10 inch guns from Battery Russell. Wednesday morning Batteries B and E will be transported by truck to Fort Canby for six inch gun practice. It is probable that the trip will take over 18 hours.
