

Woodburn Wins County Legion Junior Title Second Time

COACH SELECTS ADDED PLAYERS

Salem Beaten 9-3, Places
Two on County Team;
Practice Called

WOODBURN, June 21.—Victorious in the Marion county race for the second successive year, the Woodburn American Legion Junior baseball team tonight began looking ahead to the district series which will start July 2. The local team became county champion by defeating the Salem Juniors here today, 9 to 3.

Following this game, Coach Pete DeGure of the Woodburn team, following consultation with the local committee on junior ball, announced his squad for the district series. Although the boys have not been assigned to positions, these are the positions they played on their local teams:

Catchers, Voget of Woodburn, Morgan of Stayton.

The Italian Menace

DETERMINED to bring the heavyweight championship to Italy for the first time in ring history, the giant Primo Carnera expects to be in the best condition of his career when he boxes Jack Sharkey next week. The big Italian has looked very good in some of his recent workouts.

Always a pretty fair boxer for such a big man, da Preem is rapidly becoming a highly skillful ringman. As a rule, fighters build on such a large scale are slow and easy to hit, but the big guy is not like the ordinary giant.

In their first fight Sharkey hammered the vast Venetian into defeat with a barrage of looping left hooks to the head and body. However, in their coming fracas, the champion will find Carnera a very difficult target to nail with this kind of attack. Primo has learned Jess Willard's old trick of leaning back out of the range of punches; and in his training workouts he is holding his right glove high in order to pick off left hooks.

Carnera and Willard would have

made a very interesting fight. The Italian is heavier than old Jess was in his prime, but Willard was just as tall if not a trifle taller than the Preem.

Carnera is much faster footed than the old Pottawatomie Pole, but Willard was a much harder puncher with his right hand. Dempsey always claimed that the right uppercut that Willard nailed him with in the third round of their Toledo fight was the hardest punch he ever took in his fist career.

They have been trying to teach Carnera to use a right uppercut as a counter, after stepping away from an opponent's lead, but as yet he has been unable to execute it with the punch.

Bill Duffy made a very wise move in engaging the former St. Paul boxing master, Billy De Foe, as Carnera's trainer for the fight. Fight fans will remember De Foe as one of the smartest and cleverest featherweights in modern ring history. Bill's specialty was his left jab, which he used to great effect.

Most present day fighters don't know how to use a jab effectively.

They just flip their straight lefts in a rather aimless fashion in order to measure their man for a left hook or right cross. The old timers used to use the left jab as a real offensive weapon, putting plenty of force and weight behind their straight lefts.

Carnera has already shown in his last few fights that he has a better left jab than most present day boxers. His jab is no love tap—it was a left jab that sent poor Ernie Schaaf on that last fatal trip to the canvas.

Jeffries used to knock 'em down with his straight left, and this big Italian is much larger and stronger than the bear-like brawler was in his prime.

Unless Sharkey finds some way of foiling Carnera's left-jabbing attack, he'll find himself being left-handed off the throne just as he jabbed Schmeling out of the championship last year.

It's a cinch that Jack can't trade left jabs with this big fellow—Carnera's reach is much too long for THAT.

From Klamath Falls comes a sport page containing a box score, and the box score in turn contains the information that in a game at Eagle Point Sunday, a catcher named Edwards got three hits out of five trips to the plate. Probably this needs no further explanation, but just in case, we'll mention that Catcher Edwards is, and for many years has been, known as "Frisco."

Did Eagle Point have a grade school boy pitching, Leo?

Well, never mind about that. None of the other Pelicans got any more hits than Leo did. Now that he's gone from here, it may be told. We always suspected that when Frisco was up there swinging feebly and looking foolish with the bases empty, he always did it on purpose to make the opposing pitcher think he was an easy mark. Then in a tight pinch with bases occupied, Frisco would step up there, choke up his war club and just tap a safe one into left field. Remember? Not always, but often enough.

The Senators have another catcher this year who smacks them in the pinches. Bill Moe collected a three-bagger with the bases loaded up at Bend.

In connection with the moving of the Oregon - Oregon State football game next fall to Portland, Portland business men have made arrangements whereby the entire student personnel of both institutions may, by merely showing student body tickets, ride the cushions to Portland and view the game, then ride home again, without cost to those aforesaid "taxpayers."
