Seeks Accident Money—Suit was filed in circuit court yesterday by Carl Smolinsky against the Mutual Benefit Health and Accident association, seeking to recover \$720 and costs allegedly due on an accident policy held by the plaintiff since 1929. He alleges that he was seriously injured June 10, 1932, when he fell on a sharp spike, the accident disabling him and entitling him to benefits for 12 months. Sixty dollars a month should have been paid, he asserts, whereas he received only \$50.

SLAYER OF HINDU COMMITS SUICIDE

FAIRFIELD, Calif., June 22—(AP)—Lips from which authorities had hoped to learn the motive for California's latest Hindu killing were sealed in death as Lachman Singh, alleged slayer of Dharma Singh, was found hanged with his turban in his jail cell here today.

The Hindu, a former temple priest in Stockton, apparently tied the turban around his neck, fastened the other end to the top of the cell and then stepped off a bench, officers said. Lachman Singh was arrested after the bullet-riddled body of Dharma Singh, a wealthy merchant, was found on River Island in the Sacramento river near Rio Vista early Tuesday. Sheriff J. R. Thornton said Lachman Singh admitted he was the slayer but refused to reveal the motive and declared over and over: "I will tell my own countrymen."

Officers had hoped the motive of the crime would have helped to clear up the reasons for numerous other Hindu slayings in the past few years.
