

JOBLESS AGAIN CAMP ON LAWN

Not Satisfied With County Court Reply; Inability To Comply Outlined

The court in its answer to the "demands" pointed out that federal regulations effective July 1, 1933, put all relief work under Red Cross supervision and required investigation of each case where relief was sought.

Provision Made for

All Needy Persons
It is stated that food, shelter and clothing had been furnished for all needy persons in the county. Relief in West Salem, a part of Polk county, is under the jurisdiction of that county's authorities, the court pointed out.

Answering the "demand" that 50 cents an hour wages be paid, the court declared such a condition impossible, since the federal relief agency requested a maximum wage of \$1.50 daily be paid, a scale which if exceeded, might cause all relief for this county to be discontinued.

The court pointed out that \$150,000 in relief funds had been distributed to 12,000 people in this county since January 1, with the federal government and Marion county providing funds.

"The court is absolutely powerless to force either the water company, the light company or the gas company to furnish free service to any individual," the formal statement read.

Needy Not Working

On County Woodpile

In response to the "demand" for free fuel the court pointed out that 2000 cords of wood had been distributed by it in Salem this winter through relief agencies and that free wood could always be had by persons willing to cut it.

"Notwithstanding this fact, and the fact that this offer is open at all times, not a single individual of the unemployed is now engaged in cutting or has made application to cut wood for present or next winter's use," the court declared.

The court declined to act on the "demand" that Max Farrar be allowed to receive visitors, pointing out that it had no jurisdiction over the sheriff's department.

"The court feels that the purpose of mass action on the part of the so-called unemployed is not to secure relief for any whom it is claimed are being unfairly treated, but is done solely for the purpose of attempting to secure for the participants in such mass movements an unfair advantage for themselves in the matter of the relief they receive from the county," the court stated.

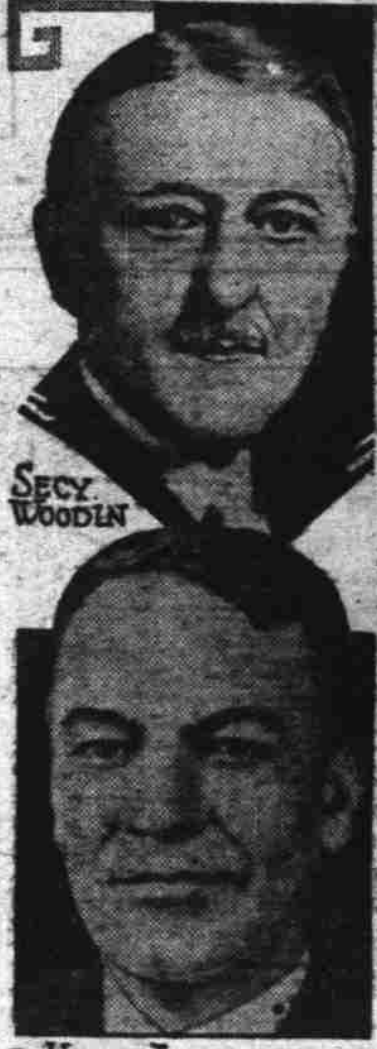

RACES TO REPLACE RODEO ATTRACTIONS

All "Wild West" Features Are Eliminated Here at Molalla Request

Substitution of horse races for the wild horse, mule and steer rides at the outdoor show which will be staged at the state fairgrounds here July 2, 3 and 4, was agreed upon at a meeting in Portland Saturday between Gilbert W. Harris and E. R. Wallace of the Molalla Buckaroo and Ed Wright who is staging the shows at both places. Mr. Gehlhar, head of the state agricultural department acting as arbiter, insisted upon elimination from the Salem show of any features the Molalla delegation found objectionable.

Because of a state law, no horse races may be held on Sunday, but additional outdoor vaudeville will be added to make the three days a mixed type of outdoor show and not a "rodeo."

An agreement had been reached June 1 that no championship contests in calf roping, bulldogging and bronco riding would be held here and that all riders of wild horses, mules and steers would be exhibitions with no purses. The Salem show was built, pursuant to this arrangement, largely of outdoor vaudeville and stunt acts, but 30 minutes of exhibition rides of rodeo stocks were included. At the Portland meeting Friday the Molalla committee felt that these events might be mistaken for regular rodeo events, and so they were eliminated.

The meeting was entirely harmonious and resulted in entire satisfaction to all parties. Mr. Wright stated that he felt he would have a better show here than was previously planned, but that he would be put to some additional expense. His string of wild horses will be shipped to Molalla to make room for race horses. He emphasizes that it will not be a race meet, but that the races will only be part of his mixed outdoor show.

Mayor of Rogue River Convicted Of Ballot Theft

MEDFORD, Ore., June 23—(AP)—Walter J. Jones, mayor of the town of Rogue river, was convicted by a circuit court jury here today of a charge of complicity in the theft of several thousand ballots from the Jackson county courthouse last February. Jones was the second of a score of men indicted in the ballot theft case to stand trial.

Arthur Ladieu of Medford, first to be tried, was also convicted. Selection of a jury to hear the trial of John Glenn, former county jailer, the third to go on trial, was temporarily halted today when the venire was exhausted. A new panel was ordered.

Temple officials, including Miss Harriet Jordan, manager, and friends of the noted evangelist, said they considered the cable as a hoax or a "plant."
