### Nearly Half of Tax Delinquent, Present Status

Tax delinquencies in Oregon for the first half of 1933, with three counties yet to report, were estimated Friday by members of the state tax commission at \$9,078,882.88 or 44.73 per cent of the total.

Tax delinquencies in 1932 based on reports from all counties in the state, were 38 per cent. Members of the tax commission said that it was likely that the total tax delinquencies for 1933 would be increased to nearly 50 per cent, although the exact percentage could not be determined until all of the reports are received and tabulated.

Taxes charged against the counties for the year 1933 totalled \$40,594,291.81, of which \$20,297,145.98 were classified as first half. Taxes have been collected in the amount of \$11,218,257.30.

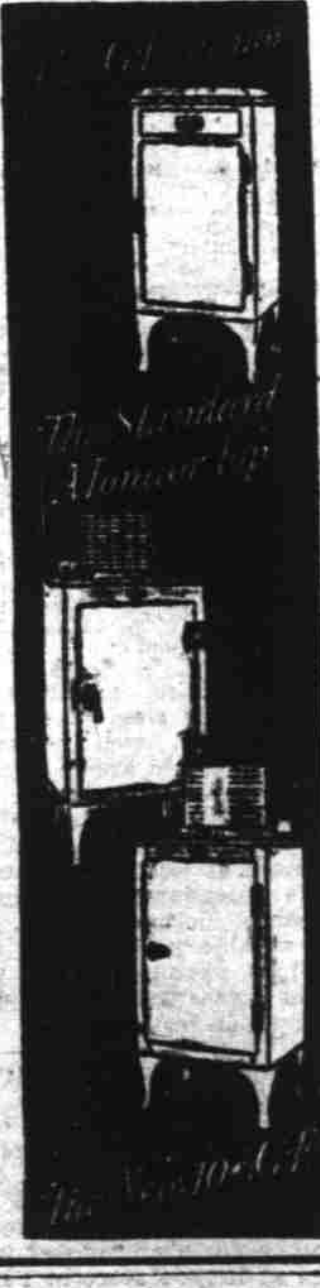

## Even Shipley Surprised at His Bargains

Fifteen years of finding almost unbelievable bargains at Shipley's on Bargain Day has evidently quite gone to the heads of Salem shoppers, for when they picked up yesterday morning's Statesman and found advertised such items as "knitted suits at 55c," they blithely went to Shipley's early in the morning and requested knitted suits for just 55 cents, which, most of them were ready to admit, was a ridiculously low price even for Bargain Day.

Suits and frocks previously priced at \$2.98 and \$1.00 for the day were sold at the advertised price to make good an error in the advertisement. That error was only one of a series of mistakes made by the Shipley prices quoted for the sale.

A long dissertation might explain to those uninitiated in the mysteries of printing and stereotyping the source of the error. Suffice it to say, that the two Salem daily papers occasionally run identical advertisements in which case the second paper to publish the ad commonly merely picks up from the other the matrix, a paper mache impression of the original type from which a metal impression is taken.

When a Statesman advertising man called for the matrix of the Shipley ad Thursday night he was given, through error, an impression taken from the uncorrected composition instead of that taken from the ad as it was run in the evening paper. Since it is not common to make more than one matrix of a given page it was naturally supposed that the correct one had been received and not until the paper was on the streets Friday morning was the error discovered.

In such a case it is not easy to place the blame for errors but obviously, the mistake was not Mr. Shipley's although he made good to his customers the promise made through the columns of this newspaper.
