

Kitball Under Floodlights Will Start Tonight, 8:30

NEW SCHEDULE IS ANNOUNCED

Six Teams, Reorganized and Strengthened, to Open Summer Program

Night baseball will be inaugurated in Salem tonight at 8:30 o'clock on Sweetland field. Well, if anybody wants to be fussy about it, it's really kitball, but as hundreds of fans have discovered this year, that's practically the same thing, and certainly as exciting.

At a meeting of the reorganized Salem Kitball league Monday night at the Y. M. C. A., the club managers decided to play the night schedule, calling for a game at 8:30 and another at 9:30, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights.

This week, however, the first games will be tonight, Tuesday; and next week there will be no Monday night games because of the Fourth.

So tonight at 8:30 Parker's, a team composed largely of former Western Paper converting players, and Walt's Market, a team organized from the nucleus of the former Salem Golf club team, will inaugurate night ball, and at 9:30 Salem Linen Mills and Kay Woolen Mills will play. All teams have been strengthened.

A few changes have been made in the rules. Base stealing is permitted only on a passed ball or wild pitch, which occurs when the ball touches the ground after touching or passing the catcher. Scoring is permitted only on a fair hit, or when a play is being made for a base runner. The pitching distance will be 37 feet, and the batter's box 5 by 4 feet.

So interested were the kitballers in getting night ball started, that they dug down in their pockets and produced a considerable sum as guarantee to obtain the use of the lights, which Willamette university is providing at a minimum charge. Admission prices will be 10 cents for adults and 5 cents for children. Following is the first week's schedule:

Ballyhoo Grows Louder as Title Fight Nears; Kidnap Threat Worries Champion

NEW YORK, June 26—(AP)—All the familiar trappings of bygone heavyweight successes flapped about the scene today as Champion Jack Sharkey and Challenger Primo Carnera punched merrily away in their training camps, almost ready for 15 rounds in the Madison Square Garden bowl Thursday night.

The ballyhoo blew torridly across the champion's testing grounds at Orangeburg, New York, where the camp followers still are recovering from a breathless week end, Sharkey's 400 mile drive to Boston and back Saturday and the letters threatening to kidnap his children that sent him on the frantic dash.

Today it was "good time" Walter Friedman, international wanderer and one of the many managers of Carnera, who caused the excitement. He sneaked into the champion's workout, disguised as a ghost in a cloud of smoke from

a fine five cent cigar and issued forth after the workout with the following statement for the press: "That Sharkey looks like a big bum. It was the worst exhibition of supposedly championship boxing that I've ever seen. If Carnera doesn't knock him out in eight rounds, I'll retire him to the nearest circus. Carnera will win in a walk."

An antidote was administered by Hans Birkle, German heavyweight who went ten close rounds with Carnera last summer and who now is sparring with Sharkey. The champion boxed three rounds today, two with Burkie and one with Chester Matan.

"Jack is a clever man," said Burkie thoughtfully. "You can't hit him the same punch more than once. He is too fast, has too many methods of getting under the Italian's left hand to make Primo's only means of defense effective. Jack should win easily. He should really knock Carnera out."

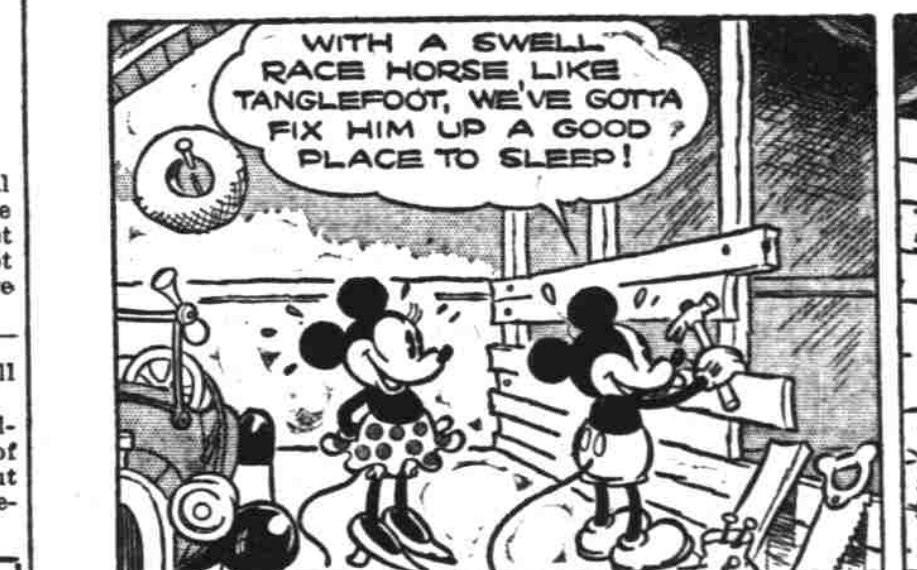
The demonstration here follows strikes last week and today of Filipino plantation workers in which sugar cane knives were brandished at Aiea, near Honolulu, Tuesday.

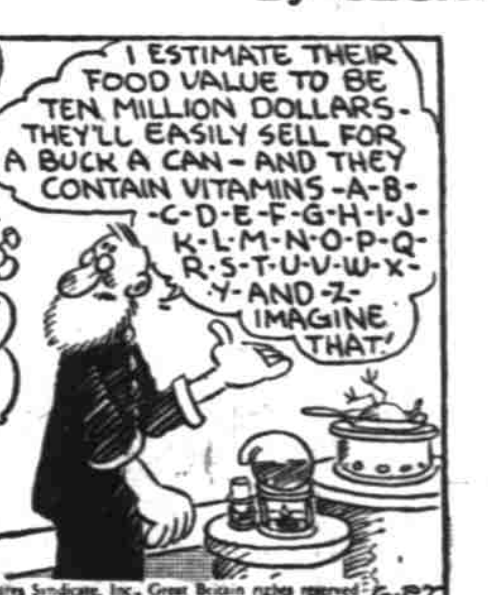
