

SUMMER SCHOOL AT MT. ANGEL OPENED

MT. ANGEL, June 27.—About 100 are attending the six weeks summer school at Mt. Angel Normal and college extension. Registration was Monday and classes started this morning.

Courses available are: Methods in lower grades, methods in higher grades, social ethics, music and art for grade school teachers, German, history, English and psychology. Both the lower and higher grade methods will be taught by Miss Clara Stroud, teacher from the normal school at Bellingham, Wash.

This is the first time that summer school has been held at Mt. Angel. Mt. Angel Normal has lately been recognized by the Oregon state department of education and by the northwest association and is now a fully accredited normal school.
