WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's cabinet board in charge of the \$3,300,000,000 public work program has set tomorrow for a discussion of the hours of work and dollars in pay for the men to be employed on the great construction projects.

It was made known today that the board would have before it a suggestion by Hugh S. Johnson, administrator of the national recovery act, for a 32 hour week and a 45 cents an hour rate.
