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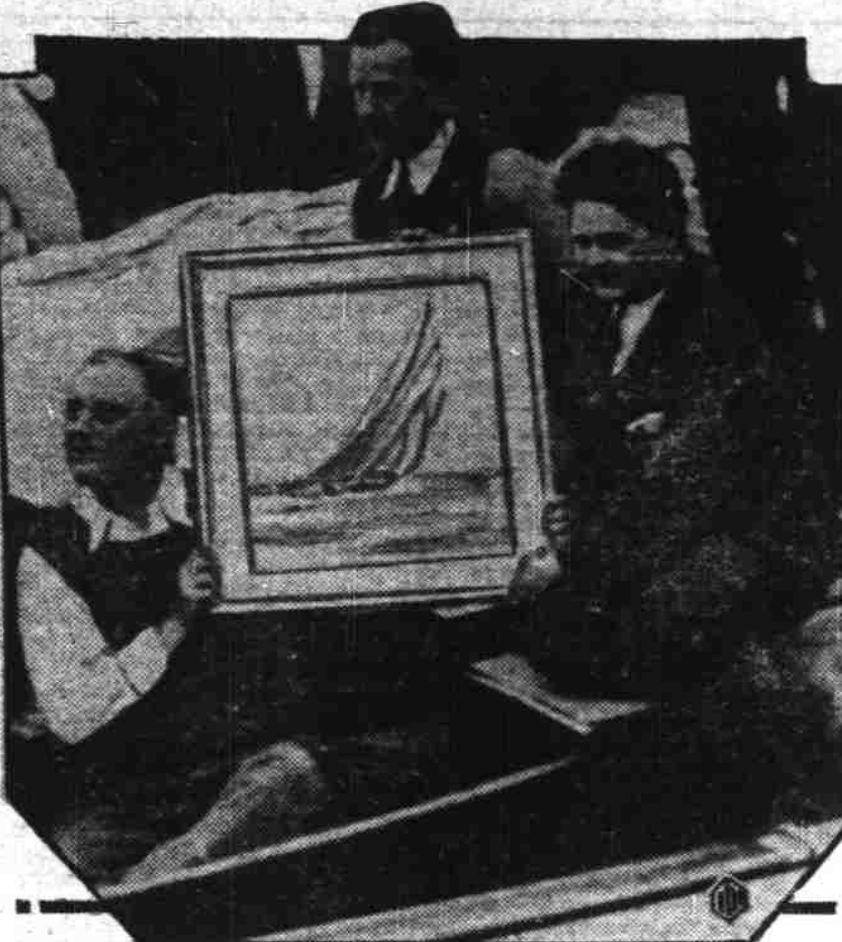
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DISTINGUISHED SEAMAN HONORED

Mrs. Wyn Dyer is recovering from an operation at the Salem sanitarium.

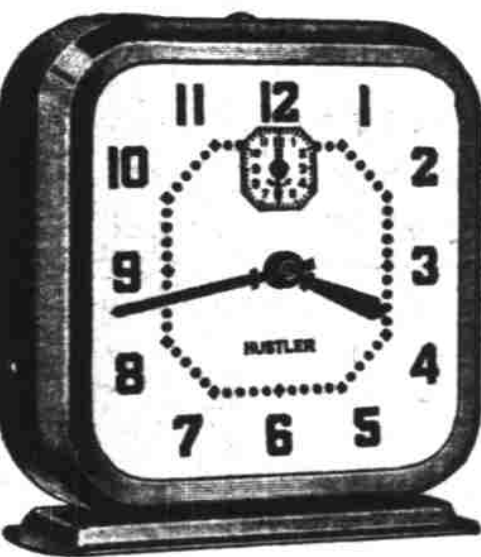
Officers Retained By Sunday School Group in County

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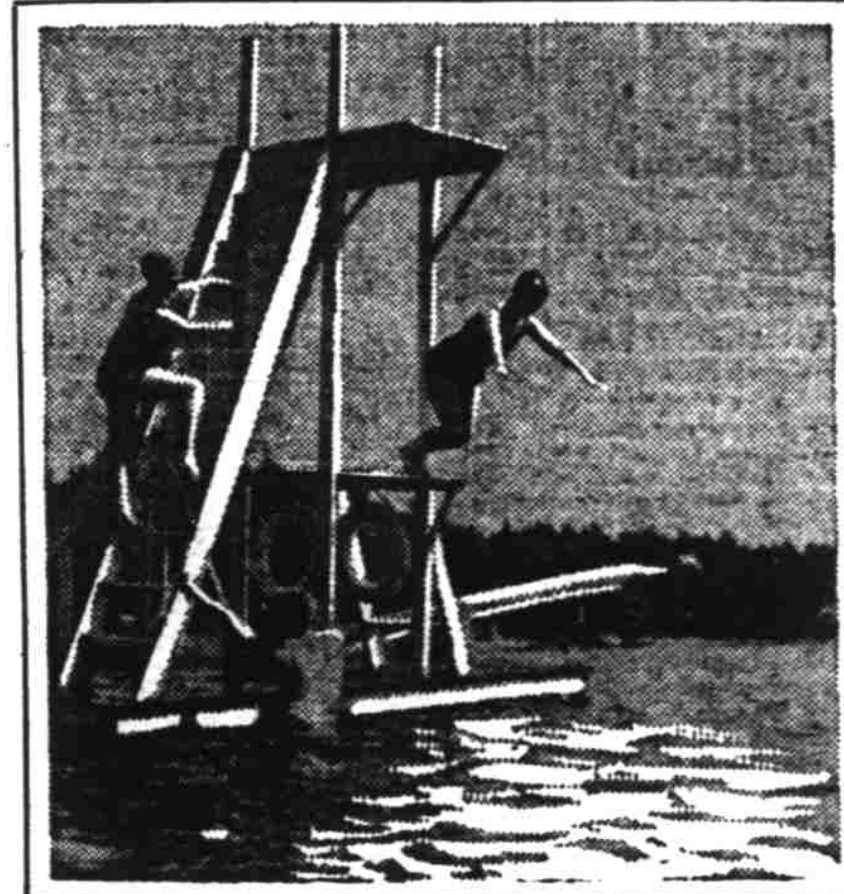


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
