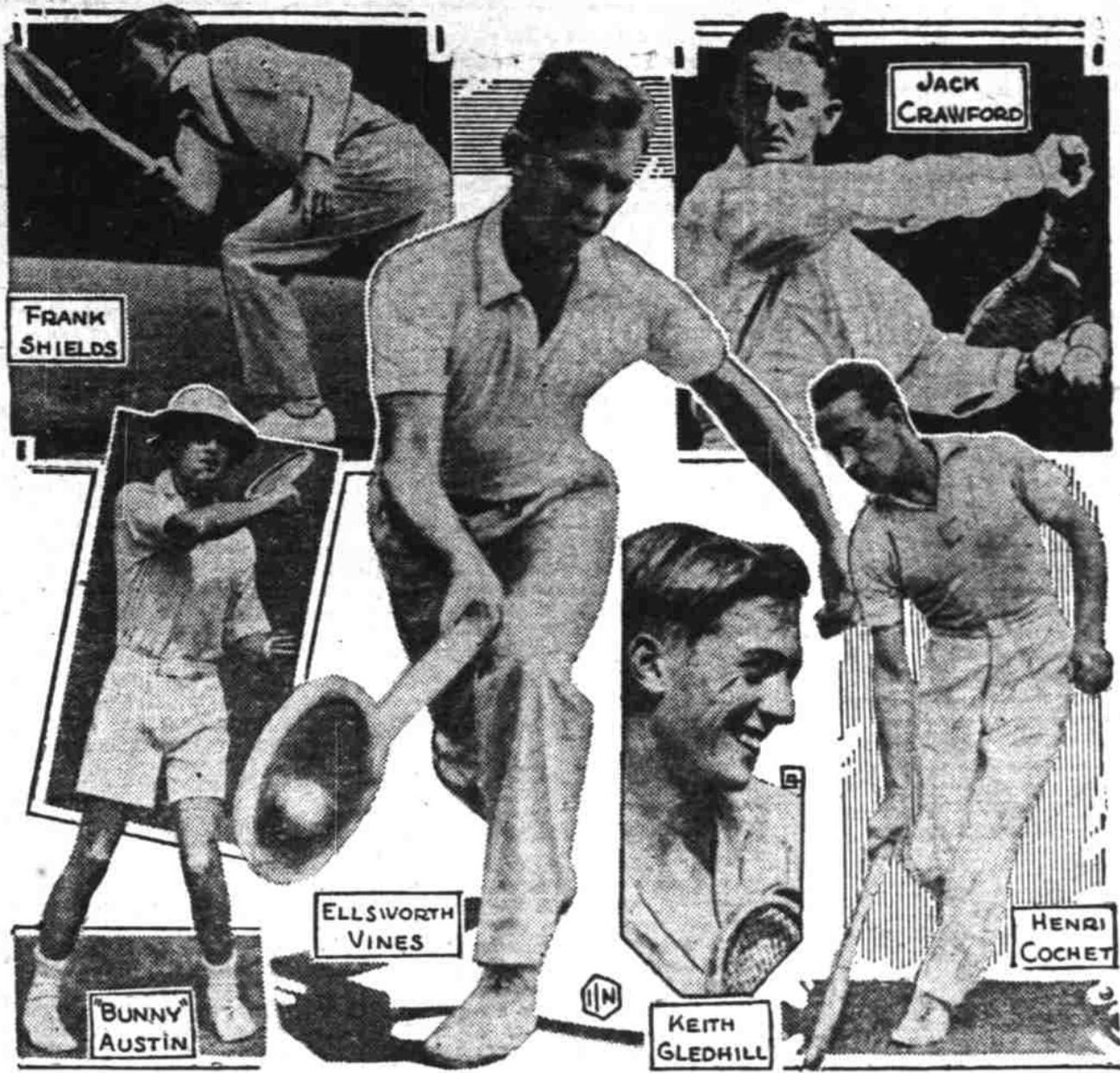
### Polk Dry Forces Working; House to House Canvass on

### Fireworks Almost Human; Brilliant, Noisy Display At Fairgrounds on Fourth

Typical of the "bigger and better" slogan of Capital post No. 9, American Legion, in planning for this year's Fourth of July celebration at the state fairgrounds, is the fireworks display, which judging by its description is one of the most unusual and outstanding ever presented in the Willamette valley.

Some of the odd features are the "Goofy-Gusses" which chase each other from one end of the field to the other; a "Japanese Garden" of variegated Roman candles; the "saucissons," whirling

pieces which leave a brilliant silver trail behind; the "silver birds"; "waterfall" and "parachute" shells; the "crazy wheel"; the "cat-wheels" giving the effect of two cats chasing each other; "Hesitating Susie," a flying wheel with an almost human propensity for changing its mind, and the "aerial sky wanderers," rockets with a duration three times the ordinary rocket.

And there will be plenty of noise, too, for final bomb, completing the show, will be audible for a distance of 10 miles, the manufacturers promise. Another number in which noise will be the principal feature is the "battle of Verdun." At intervals throughout the program, a series of shells and mines will be exploded.

Of special patriotic significance is the "American" wheel with the national colors in brilliant circles of flame; and the finale showing the American Legion emblem in its true colors, followed by the heavy bombardment on the ground and then overhead, reminiscent of the world war, to be followed by the extremely heavy finale bomb.

The fireworks last year were held until after the wrestling show was over, but this year they will be shown before the main event of the wrestling match, and will start not later than 9:30.

Wrestling patrons will be able to see the display from their seats, but special arrangements are being made to accommodate those who do not patronize the wrestling.
