Measure Held Up—The state department yesterday sent telegrams to all county clerks in Oregon instructing them to omit from the ballot at the special election July 21 the referendum measure attacking the grange power law enacted by the 1933 legislature. This action was taken following the issuance of a temporary injunction by Judge Lewelling of the Marion county circuit court restraining the secretary of state from certifying the referendum measure to the county clerks. Completed petitions for the referendum measure were filed by the Security Owners association.

Hoss Makes Rolling—On and after July 1 all motor vehicles operated interstate between Oregon and Idaho will be subject to license in both states, provided these operations are for compensation or profit. It was announced at the offices of Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, Wednesday. Motor trucks owned by farmers who are delivering products of their farm or orchard to market, will be allowed to pass in and out of either state under license of the state in which they are owned.

The club also will hear reports on the state convention at Roseburg and decide whether or not to recess during July and August.

Start Work Early—Hearings in the state supreme court will start at 9 a. m., beginning today. Members of the court said this action would expedite the proceedings and give the justices more time in which to prepare opinions which are handed down on Tuesdays. Acting Chief Justice Rossman has set four cases for hearing today, all of which will be completed before the noon recess.

Authorizes Sale—Sale of a City of North Bend improvement bond, due in November, 1932, for 38 cents on the dollar was authorized yesterday in circuit court in the case of the Scotts Mills bank, now being liquidated by the state banking department. The state treasurer will buy the bond which has a par and book value of \$500. May interest on the bond was met by North Bend by the issuance of a tax anticipation warrant.

Foreclosure Recommended—Foreclosure by the Aurora school district of its claim for \$23,500 against the Willamette Valley Mortgage company was recommended this week in a grand jury report filed here. The mortgage company is now in the hands of a receiver. The funds were advanced by the district to the company as investment for the monies pending their use to erect a new school building at Aurora.

Married 57 Years—Mr. and Mrs. John Gritton, 1067 Fir street, will today observe their 57th wedding anniversary. Mr. Gritton is 85 years old, and she is 74 years old. In spite of their ages, both get about "right smart," and in addition to caring for their housework take joy in their own garden, which they keep up. They have been residents of Salem for 35 years.

To Distribute Money—Distribution of county school fund monies will shortly be made by Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, who plans to pro-rate more than \$30,000 among the districts on a rate of \$3 per capita. No distribution will be made, however, until the clerk of the district receiving the monies has filed his or her bond.

Ballots Ordered—An order for 25,000 official and 25,000 sample ballots for the July 21 election was placed this week by the county clerk. The ballots will be distributed several days before the vote is cast so prospective voters may acquaint themselves with the issues.

Pleads Statute—A plea that the statute of limitations has outlawed the claim of the plaintiff was filed by defendants yesterday in the case of Schramm against B. Albker. Schramm sued to collect funds allegedly due a bank he is liquidating.

Salisbury Arrested—Forrest Salisbury admitted driving without an operator's license and was fined \$5 and costs in justice court yesterday. Fine was remitted and he was placed on probation for six months.

INDICTMENT SYSTEM CHANGE IS ENDORSED

W. L. Morse, dean of the school of law at the state university, talked to Salem Rotarians Wednesday noon on reforms in criminal law and procedure. He particularly endorsed the pending constitutional amendment which will permit filing of indictments by information by the district attorney as well as by true bill of grand jury. This would be more economical and would expedite procedure in criminal cases. The chief delays, he complained, were in the action of grand juries.

Regarding the frequent assertion that there are too many laws, Morse asserted that as society became more closely integrated additional new laws would be required. At the same time laws get to be dead letters or are nullified by common consent, like the hitch-hiker's law.

He also pointed out the clash between social scientists on one hand, and practicing lawyers on the other. The former demand reforms, while the latter cling to ancient practices. He announced a gathering in Seattle next year when representatives of both groups would argue out their respective positions.

COUNTY UNAFFECTED BY BAN ON INTEREST

While the newly enacted Glass-Steagall banking legislation forbids commercial banks payment of interest on demand accounts, Marion county is still receiving two per cent interest on its deposits in banks in this county, it was learned yesterday. This rate has prevailed for a number of years and conforms to the two per cent rate set by state law for payment on open accounts carried in banks by the state.

Banking officials at the statehouse said the Glass-Steagall act permitted banks to continue to pay two per cent on public funds where state laws called for such payments.

Marion county has always carried heavy balances in banks throughout the county and interest on these deposits has constituted a sizeable budgeted income annually.

FAIRGROUNDS LABOR ISSUE TO BE AIRED

The arbitration committee of the Salem Trades and Labor council is soon to investigate the alleged failure of Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, to employ organized labor in the maintenance of buildings at the state fairgrounds, Theodore Amend, secretary, reported yesterday. The action was ordered by the council, he said.

The argument was advanced that the 1932 state fair made a profit of approximately \$15,000, and that additional funds would be received through the operation of the state racing commission. It was charged that the maximum wage now being paid by Gehlhar is \$1.50 a day, of which \$1 is in cash and 50 cents in groceries. Labor leaders said this compensation was inadequate under existing conditions.

Woman Injured When Auto and Truck Collide

DALLAS, June 28—Mrs. Guy Ford of Tillamook was injured slightly when the car driven by her husband collided with a county gravel truck near Gold creek bridge on the Willamina-Grand Ronde highway at 11 a. m. today. The left front wheel and fender was torn from each machine and other slight damage was done. Mrs. Ford was the only one injured.
