

WET MARGIN HUGE IN WEST VIRGINIA

CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 28—(AP)—First state south of the Mason and Dixon line to act on repeal, West Virginia has voted to ratify the 21st amendment by a majority of 13-5 to 1.

With only 19 of the state's 2338 precincts unheard from in yesterday's election, the count stands:

For repeal, 219,225; against, 136,415—a majority of 82,812. Repealists were quick to assert that West Virginia's espousal of the wet clause will set the example for other southern states, but prohibition chiefs contend West Virginia must be considered a northern state, different in tradition from the south.

There are 20 delegates on the repeal slate swept in by the election. The delegates will meet in convention July 25 officially to cast West Virginia's ratification of the 21st amendment to the national constitution, repealing the 18th.

West Virginia next year will take a referendum on its state prohibition act which went into effect in 1912, eight years before national prohibition became effective.

VOLSTEAD DROPPED AS PROH ADVISOR

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 28.—(AP)—Andrew J. Volstead, an author of the enforcement act bearing his name, was divorced today from official connection with its administration.

The grey-haired, wrinkled 72 year old legal adviser to the eighth district prohibition administrator with headquarters here, was notified today he would be indefinitely furloughed July 1. He said he was not surprised and had not changed his mind about prohibition since he helped draft the Volstead law in 1919.

"Yes, I expected when the appropriation was cut in half that I would be asked to quit about July 1," he observed. "It was no surprise."

Volstead's code is hard work, though lately he has been forced to ease up somewhat because of heart trouble. For this reason, he said, he would not participate in the campaign against prohibition repeal in Minnesota. This state votes on the proposal to repeal the 18th amendment September 12.

Two years ago he expressed belief prohibition never would be thrown aside by the nation. Retiring, not much given to talk and harboring a distaste for publicity almost equal to his abhorrence of intoxicants, Volstead will return to his old home at Granite Falls, Minn.

INITIAL MARRIAGE LAW WAIVERS MADE

For the first time since the so-called gin marriage law became effective, County Judge Sigmund yesterday set aside its provision in two written orders, which allowed couples applying for marriage licenses to receive them at once.

The judge does not intend to sign such orders as a matter of general practice although Circuit Judge Latourette has announced at Oregon City that he will waive the three-day waiting provision except where the applicants are under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

MISUSE OF TRUST FUNDS IS ALLEGED

Claim that the Bank of Stayton had misused trust funds of \$2800 placed with it for investment just before it closed in May, 1932, was made Wednesday in circuit court here in an answer filed by Elmer Archambeau to a suit recently brought by F. J. Laiky, administrator of the estate of Augusta Kreuger, against A. W. Sunderman, Archambeau and others.

The answering defendant contends he placed \$2800 with J. W. Mayo, cashier of the bank now being liquidated. Mayo allegedly agreeing to loan the money on a first-mortgage against property owned by A. W. and Carrie M. Sunderman. Defendant asserts that the bulk of the money instead was placed by Mayo for the bank's credit in a local institution. He asks for the return of the entire \$2800, and interest, to him.

TRI-FAMILY GROUP WILL MEET JULY 4

SCIO, June 28.—(Special)—Annual reunion of the Thomas, Shelton and Bilyeu families will be held July 4 on the Thurston Thomas farm, 12 miles east of Scio. Riley Shelton of Scio has announced. The family settled on Thomas Basin 87 years ago.

First to arrive was Frederick Thomas and family, who came to Linn county in Oregon, then a territory, in 1846. The following year Haman Shelton, Sr., and family and in 1852 followed the William Bilyeu family and other Bilyeu groups.

Thomas and Sheltons settled on Thomas Creek and the Bilyeus on Bilyeu Creek. Thurston Thomas, owner of the farm on which the reunion will be held, now resides at Stayton. He is a grandson of the 1842 pioneer, Frederick Thomas.

WALLACE DEBARKS, THEN PLANE BURNS

GOODLAND, Kas., June 28.—(AP)—A United States Airways passenger plane, which carried Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture from Kansas City to Salina today, later was destroyed by fire near Goodland after it had made a forced landing and the four passengers got out safely. Explosion of a fuel tank destroyed the ship immediately afterward.

Secretary Wallace, Cal Ward, president of the Farmers' Union in Kansas, and George W. Catts, agriculture commissioner of the Kansas City chamber of commerce, left the plane at Salina where Wallace delivered an address.

As the plane neared Goodland at a height of 2000 feet, Pilot Gordon Darnell noticed flames coming from the motor. He made a forced landing in a corn field.
