UNIVERSITY BOOKS SHOW MORE CASH

Willamette university ends its 1932-1933 fiscal year today with about \$400 more cash on hand than was estimated when the annual report was made to the trustees 10 days ago. N. S. Savage, business manager, reported yesterday that collection had slightly exceeded and expenditures somewhat gone below his estimates of a fortnight ago.

The school will pay all its bills today or set aside cash reserves to meet them without bank borrowing. In addition it has provided \$400 for the trip of the Philharmonic choir to Chicago.

In June, 1932, \$4200 was borrowed at a local bank to enable the university to meet its year's expenses. At the 1932-1933 costs were cut and the loan retired out of current income.

PURCHASER NOTES ADVANCING PRICES

Increasing prices for most all goods is already very noticeable in making state purchases, William Einzig, secretary of the state board of control, declared yesterday. Certain staples such as muslin, used in large quantities by the state hospitals, has increased 30 per cent in the last 90 days.

Einzig said that the state had made heavy purchases early this spring, anticipating the rise and consequently its budget for supplies will not be unbalanced for a considerable period. By next January, when the third quarter of the biennium begins, Einzig said increased prices may operate to throw the budget out of balance inasmuch as funds allotted for goods will be insufficient to provide goods at the higher prices.

The 1933 legislature passed a drastically reduced budget for 1933-1934. At that time it was pointed out that any major advances in commodity prices would upset the calculations.
