Victoria Youth Stops Egan Despite Brilliant Rally of Veteran Defending Champ

VICTORIA, B. C., June 29—(AP)—Alpa Taylor, youthful Victoria shot maker, hurled a startling upset into the Pacific Northwest Amateur Golf tournament today, shooting sterling golf and choking off the desperate closing bid of H. Chandler (Chan) Egan, defending titlist of Medford, Ore., to win, 3 and 1.

The veteran Egan, who first began winning golf titles more than 30 years ago and who was seeking his sixth northwest title, fell far behind in the morning round and went to lunch six down.

The 19-year-old Taylor, son of the Victoria golf club professional, was shooting steady golf, turning in a 70, or one over par for the round, while weak putting was costing Egan heavily. In the afternoon, five up and six to go on Egan, Taylor saw his lead whittled down on the next three holes and his opponent lying 18 inches from the cup on the 34th for another win in a birdie three, only to miss for a half in four.

Then came victory on the long 35th after the defending champion had missed his second shot, and Taylor had sunk a 10-footer for a birdie four.

Tomorrow, Taylor will battle another veteran, Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, former Walker cup star. Dr. Willing today put out Ken Black of Vancouver, 5 and 4.

Four Seattle players, with Lee Stell the only veteran among them, battled in the upper bracket, and Stell and Albert (Scotty) Campbell, Seattle city champion and runner-up at the national public links tourney last year, came through successfully.

In the women's play, Mrs. Vera Hutchings, of Vancouver, defending champion, advanced to the semi-finals with a 4 and 3 victory over Mrs. E. E. Eva, Portland. She was joined by two other Portland women, Mrs. G. J. James and Miss Marion McDougall, and the other semi-finalist will be Mrs. W. A. Kirkman, of Seattle.

HOLIDAY ON MONDAY IS NOT UNANIMOUS

A number of Salem stores, among them the leading mercantile, grocery and clothing businesses, will remain open Monday, in spite of plans of smaller stores to remain closed Monday and Tuesday.

Announcement to this end Thursday definitely put to rest any hopes of a general closing to give employers and employees a three-day holiday. Larger stores, faced with a heavy payroll and big overhead, have consistently indicated that they would not close.

Virtually all the stores on Liberty street will be open for business Monday, and a number of stores which indicated they would close if all houses did so, will likely remain open that day also.

All beauty parlors, medical and lumber dealers, furniture stores and hardware businesses in the city will be closed Monday as previously announced.

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Minimum Wage For Canneries Gets Approval

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29—(AP)—Bernal H. Dyas, chairman of the California Industrial Welfare commission, announced here today the commission will ask federal approval of the 27 1/2 cents an hour wage rate for women in the canning industry proposed as uniform for the three Pacific coast states.

The wage, approved as a minimum in the industry by representatives of California, Oregon and Washington, Dyas declared will be the highest in the United States. He said the commission will urge the government to bring about its adoption in other states.

CROWLEY REMOVAL UPHELD BY BOARD

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29—(AP)—The municipal civil service board here today unanimously sustained the dismissal of G. F. Crowley, former clerk in the public works department. The decision of the board came at the close of a hearing which developed sensational charges that Crowley had persistently pressed unwelcome familiarity upon women and young girls of his department.

Dismissed by Commissioner A. L. Barbur, Crowley demanded the hearing of the case when he appealed to the civil service board under the rights of civil service organization.

Charges upon which Crowley was dismissed May 10 were that his conduct toward women in and out of office hours had been such as to bring the public service in disrepute, that he had made improper use of benevolent funds entrusted to his care and that he had falsified records to cover up overtime paid.
