

CITY LOSING FROM LIEN NON-PAYMENT

\$786,238.09 Outstanding in Improvement Liens as Interest Piles up

A tale of heavy expense to the city government through failure

of property holders to pay principal and interest on bonds and assessments for street and sidewalk improvements is told by the lien docket at the city hall. The city has \$786,238.09 in outstanding improvement liens, on hundreds of which no payments are being made by the property owners. Of this amount, \$703,794.39 is bonded under the Bancroft act and \$78,855.70 unbonded, for street improvements, and \$356.83 is for sidewalk improvements, which do not come under the bonding act. The city is \$122,000 short on

the books because of non-payment by property owners of the six per cent interest drawn by the Bancroft bonds, on which the city has then to keep up the interest. The sinking fund, \$141,861 at present, from which the bonds are supposed to be retired, is instead being used to pay the interest. Since the Bancroft law was amended by the 1932 legislature, certain city aldermen are proposing to have a representative named to urge delinquent bonded property owners to refinance their obligations under this amendment. The original Bancroft act provided for bonding property for 10 years, with principal to be paid off one-tenth per year, plus interest. The amendment enables delinquent property owners who pay up back interest to start paying bond principal on a new 10-year basis, meeting one-twentieth of the principal semi-annually. Newly bonded property will also come under the amendment.

HURRICANE STREWS DEATH IN TRINIDAD

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 29—(AP)—Scenes of death and destruction were described today as repaired communication lines brought first reports from southern Trinidad of havoc wrought by Tuesday night's hurricane.

Several persons were reported drowned as small boats foundered and a number of persons injured when trees were uprooted.

The howling storm lashed the coast all Tuesday night and blew itself out Wednesday, leaving behind fallen telegraph and telephone poles, unroofed houses and broken oilfield derricks.

The hurricane, accompanied by torrential rains, reached its height in the southwest, centering around the Paloseco oil district.

The greatest losses were reported from Labrow pitch lake district, Siparia, Guapo, Cap de Ville, Point Fortin, Paloseco, Penal and Cedros.

Radigan has received word that her brother-in-law, Eugene Noxan, was critically injured last Wednesday when his truck went over a 500 foot declivity near Wallace, Idaho, and that he is still unconscious and little hope held out for his recovery. The report reaching Silverton was that his skull is badly fractured, his collar bone crushed and six ribs broken and that he is suffering internal injuries. He is married and has two small children.
