## LEGION INVITES ALL TO FOURTH OF JULY EVENT

Program for Independence Day is Told in Detail; Attractions Many

Patriotic Exercises Will Follow Sports; Title Mat Bout Feature

The completed program, showing the variety of attractions offered by Capital post No. 9 at the annual Fourth of July celebration at the state fairgrounds, was released by members of the Fourth of July committee Friday.

All residents of Salem and vicinity are invited to attend the celebration, most features of which will be free.

The program opens at 9:30 o'clock, with an extensive program of sports and races for boys and girls, with one variation in which fast men will gain the lime-light. Harry Scott is chairman of the sports program.

At 10:30 the sports will be interrupted by the patriotic exercises, also in front of the grandstand. Col. Carl Abrams is chairman. These exercises will include a number by the Capital post national drum corps, flag raising with playing of the national anthem by the Legion Junior band; remarks by Allan Carson and Jack Eakin, local and state commanders respectively of the legion; address by John W. Beard, senior chaplain of the Oregon national guard; number by drum corps.

Concerts by Three Groups are Offered  
The sports program will then be resumed and continue until noon. At 1:45 the final day's program of 25 Wright's horse racing and outdoor vaudeville attractions in front of the grandstand will start.

From 4 to 6 p. m. concerts by drum corps, the junior band, and the Salem Kiltie band will be held on the grounds, and from 6 to 8 o'clock these concerts will continue at the west entrance to the grandstand.

The wrestling show will start at 8 p. m., with the two preliminaries, Art O'Reilly vs. "Prof." Newton and "Doc" Nelson vs. Jack Mitchell, preceding the fireworks program, which will start at 9:30 sharp, in front of the grandstand.

The Roblin-Reed Henry Jones wrestling match for the world 45-pound championship will start immediately after the fireworks. Meanwhile at 9 o'clock the dancing in the dance pavilion on the grounds will get under way, and the final event will be a general carnival on the grounds at 11 o'clock.

Numerous concessions, rides and other attractions will be offered throughout the day. Families are invited to bring picnic lunches and spend the day at the fairgrounds.

## Holiday Lost by Forest Rookies; Measles Reason

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—The boys joined the civilian conservation corps they expected to meet with many and new experiences, but an unexpected and unwelcome one befell the recruits in the remote and Melrose camps near here today, the report is that leave privileges for the Fourth of July have been withdrawn and the boys, 450 of them, will have to stay in the camps for the holiday.

## Wheat Producers of Northwest Urged to Curtail; Bait Large

Over 25 Million Dollars in Cash Offered to Induce Acreage Reduction; 10 per Cent Cut Stipulated for Three States

SPOKANE, Wash., June 30.—(AP)—An offer of \$25,300,000 in cash was dangled before the eyes of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana wheat growers here today as a reward for cooperating with the federal government in its acreage reduction plan.

The figure is unofficial, computed after Dr. M. L. Wilson, federal wheat administrator, explained the government's crop control plan to extension service experts from these four states, California and Utah at a "school" meeting here.

To obtain this amount, all wheat growers in the area must agree to reduce the 1934 and 1935 planting not less than 10 per cent, Wilson said, and the money will come from a processing tax of 30 cents a bushel. It will be paid in two installments, two thirds September 15, and the balance next spring, after the spring (Turn to page 2, col. 5)

## STORE GETS LEASE ON WHITE CORNER

Pay'n Takit Will Enlarge Operations Here; Rush Work on Buiding

Consummation of a deal whereby the Pay'n Takit store system acquires a long-leased lease on the White Front corner and one-half of the Breyman buildings on North Commercial street was learned here yesterday. The chain grocery company, already in a large store on South Commercial street, will increase its Salem operations by utilizing the entire first floor of the corner building and half of the Breyman building for a large modern grocery and market.

Although the formal lease has not been signed, terms have been agreed to and a down payment made to bind the deal.

Breyman Boise said last night that the work of remodeling the building would be pushed as fast as possible so the new store could occupy its location within 30 to 40 days. The upstairs of the two buildings will be used for offices.

The south side of the Breyman building will be occupied by the Hutschen Paint store now located on South Commercial street.

The White Corner and Breyman buildings were gutted by fire early in 1932. The remodeling of the buildings this year has been in charge of F. A. Legge, Salem architect.

## SPECIAL PRIVILEGE DENIED TO LAMSON

SAN JOSE, Calif., June 30.—(AP)—All special privileges were taken away from David Lamson tonight on orders of Sheriff William J. Emig.

Lamson, who pleaded not guilty in superior court this morning to the charge of murdering his wife, Allene, in their home on the Stanford campus has been eating special meals since his arrest. Members of the family have been privileged to visit him as often as they desired.

From now on Lamson will eat jail fare. Members of his family will be permitted to see him only on regular visiting days.

Explaining his action, Emig said there had been some dissatisfaction over Lamson receiving special privileges while other prisoners, held on lesser charges, were denied them.

## Holman Complains Higher Bidders get State Jobs

Renewed criticism of Governor Julius L. Meier, of William Elmsig and of the conduct of the state purchasing department, was made yesterday by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer.

Declaring many low bidders for state supplies were receiving unfair treatment because higher bidders obtained the awards, Holman said many responsible firms in the state were withdrawing their competition and refusing to bid.

## COUNTY COSTS MAKING DRAIN ON TREASURY

Appropriations Overdrawn On Six Months Basis in Some Departments

Poor Funds are Especially Low; Saving Upon Jail Cost is Revealed

Warrants issued by Marion county for the first six months of 1933 totaled \$226,320.66, the county clerk's office announced at the close of business last night. During that period, a few appropriations were overdrawn on a six-months basis, notably the money set aside for poor.

Warrants were drawn on the various funds as follows: roads, \$121,622.03; general fund, \$100,350.54; dog license, \$1,517.63; prohibition enforcement, \$221.85; fire patrol, \$525.19; high school tuition, \$1,783.40.

The poor fund, year's appropriation for which is \$40,000, has already utilized about three-fourths of that total, or all but \$10,050.13.

Sheriff's Department  
Indicates Saving  
The sheriff's office has used more than half of the sum allotted to this department for the year, with but \$6,040.19 remaining out of a budget of \$15,594. However, the law enforcement expenditures show a healthy state, for in the jail account, less than half of the appropriated sum has been spent.

For the jail account, there is a balance of \$2,917.06, out of an appropriation of \$4,325. This is (Turn to page 2, col. 1)

## PEACE OFFICERS OF REGION VISIT HERE

Umatilla county has the highest percentage of commitments to the state penitentiary and training school for boys while Klamath county leads in actual number of commitments, and Clatsop county leads in commitments to the state hospital, Dr. S. B. Laughlin of Willamette university, told the 87 persons attending the quarterly banquet of the Northwest Oregon Officers' association at the Marion hotel last night. Exhibiting charts listing inmates in state penal and restrictive institutions, Dr. Laughlin advocated stricter eugenics laws as a means of reducing the size of the insane, feeble minded and criminal populations.

Entertainment for the officers included a solo by Sergeant Max Alford of the state police, the Ray with a orchestra and the Clough-Barick quartet. Talks were made by Martin Ferrey and Roy Hewitt. Sheriff A. C. Burk and Captain W. H. McClain of the state police arranged the program.

The next regular association meeting will be held at Portland in the fall. The southern and eastern state associations may meet jointly with the northwestern this summer, it was announced.

## Hillsboro Man Is Backed for Legion Duties

The district two American legion caucus last night recommended Paul Patterson of Hillsboro for membership on the state convention committee on committees, at the meeting at Woodburn. The caucus was composed of 35 convention delegates and alternates from 19 posts in Marion, Polk, Yamhill, Washington and Tillamook counties. From Salem were Irl S. McSherry, J. T. Delaney, R. H. Bassett and Claude McKenney.

Another caucus, at which final decisions will be made on legislative matters, will be held before the state convention at Klamath Falls in August.

## Jewelers Join In Program of Monday Closing

Another group of business houses, jewelers, yesterday unanimously signed an agreement to close their shops Monday, July 3, as well as July 4, but the larger mercantile, grocery and clothing firms continued their plans to remain open July 3. Jewelers signing for the closing included: Hartman, Pomeroy & Keene, R. C. Kruse.

Union barbers, at least, will not close on Monday, Clarence Townsend, secretary, announced yesterday. His group would have shut up shop on that day if the movement had been unanimous, he said.

## Though Dead Tusko Still Has Trouble

SEATTLE, June 30.—(AP)—Even though Tusko, the world's largest captive elephant until his death two weeks ago, is now beyond earthly cares, earthly persons won't let him rest in peace.

Two chattel liens were filed today with County Auditor George A. Grant upon "the body, bones, tusks, teeth, hide and remains of that certain elephant heretofore known as Tusko."

Both were brought against H. C. Barber, who was named as his owner.

One was filed by John Van Lammerman, and the other by the Community Packing company. Van Lammerman wants \$40 and the packing company \$14, both "on account of labor, skill and materials expended upon that property" meaning the late Tusko—at the alleged request of Barber, as owner.

The remains are being prepared for exhibitions.

## ITALY TO CHICAGO AIR TRIP STARTED

25 Seaplanes Take off at Early Hour Today for Amsterdam hop

ORBITELLO, Italy, July 1.—Saturday.—(AP)—Twenty-five powerful seaplanes roared away from Orbitello today, carrying air minister Italo Balbo and 100 of his crack fascist fliers on the first leg of a 6,100 mile cruise to Chicago.

The first plane took off at 5:45 a. m. (11:45 p. m. eastern standard time) and the rest followed in groups of three. The first scheduled stop was Amsterdam.

After leaving the lagoon here and gaining altitude, the planes dropped in formation in the air and swooped away to the northwest toward Amsterdam.

Balbo was at the controls of the first plane to leave the smooth surface of the lagoon. Balbo's flagship was flanked by two other planes forming a triangular wedge.

Only an overnight stop is planned at Amsterdam. Tomorrow morning, if everything goes well, the squadron will continue to Londonderry, North Ireland—a distance of 650 miles.

Londonderry to Reyjavik, Iceland—230 miles.  
Reyjavik to Cartwright, on Sandvick bay, Labrador—1500 miles.  
Cartwright to Shediac—800 miles.  
Shediac to Montreal—500 miles.  
Montreal to Chicago—870 miles.

## INJUNCTION GIVEN ANENT TRUCK LAW

Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon yesterday granted a temporary injunction to the Truck Owners' and Farmers' Protective association restraining the state utilities commissioner from enforcing the new truck and bus law. This injunction, the second issued last month, will permit truck owners to operate without complying with the new law until its validity has been determined, it is understood.

Coincident with a warning issued from the capital yesterday, A. C. Anderson, president of the truck association, advised truck owners to purchase new license plates for their machines, since the injunction does not apply to the regular license law.

The protective association has attracted statewide interest the past three weeks and gained the support of the Farmers' union, granges and many business men, Mr. Anderson said.

## ROOSEVELT NOT EXCITED ABOUT GOLD QUESTION

Enjoys Vacation; to Start Home Today; Cruiser Visited Friday

Thinks Money not Concern Of Parley; Nations to Find True Level

CAMPO BELLO ISLAND, N. B., June 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt is standing pat against immediate attempts by the London economic conference to stabilize currency until he is sure that the true levels of money of the various nations have been reached.

Unconcerned about this reported crisis in the London parley, Mr. Roosevelt is enjoying his vacation and waiting for the conference to get down to business on other things.

The president expects to leave for the return trip to Washington tomorrow aboard the cruiser Indianapolis. He visited this newest of America's fighting ships today and reports went out he was ready for a hasty departure for the capital. It was explained later that the chief executive wished to utilize the cruiser's wireless equipment.

Let Nations Adjust Own Standards, View  
An authoritative analysis of the American viewpoint on the ruckus over currency stabilization at London revealed here today that Mr. Roosevelt doesn't think it concerns the internal economic situation and until governments which are running far behind (Turn to page 2, col. 6)

## JUNE WEATHER IN SALEM IS AVERAGE

June approached the average in cloudiness, rainfall and temperatures, the official weather observers reported here yesterday. The maximum temperature of the month, 88 degrees on June 12, was several degrees below record figures. The minimum temperature, 37, was recorded June 1 although a light frost was noted on June 10. Mean temperature was 60.5 degrees, mean maximum 73.2 and mean minimum 47.9.

Seven days in June were clear, nine partly cloudy and 14 cloudy. Last year 15 were clear, 12 partly cloudy and five cloudy but in other recent years cloudy conditions varied little from those of last month.

Rainfall last month totalled 1.58 inches, .16 above the mean average of 1.42 inches. Only .32 inch of precipitation was recorded in June 1932 but in June 1931 the total was 3.35 inches, or the third wettest June on record. Heaviest June precipitation was recorded in 1894, 3.50 inches. No rain fell in June 1918.

## Forest Recruit Found Injured

With several teeth knocked out and his face badly cut, Charles Keasling, civilian conservation corps recruit from the Applegate camp, was found near a platform at the Southern Pacific depot last night. Police who investigated were uncertain whether he fell from the platform or from a train. They gave him a bed in city jail for the night.

## Requirements of Branch Banking Law Cause Delay

Delay in the placing of branch banks throughout the state seemed certain yesterday after an opinion by Attorney-General Van Winkle that each application for a branch bank must be approved by the state banking superintendent, subject to appeal to the state banking board if demanded.

Before the attorney-general announced his view on the new 1933 branch banking law in Oregon, an announcement had been made in Portland that one or more branch banks would be started in eastern Oregon Wednesday, July 5. No applications for the branch bank permits had been made here, however, only the comptroller of the treasury being requested for permission.

Under the Oregon law not only must a branch bank permit be petitioned for but three weeks' notice of the proposed establishment of a branch bank must be given, by publication, in the city where it is proposed the bank will be established.

State banking officials indicated yesterday considerable emphasis would be placed on the desirability of the local communities regarding branch banks, and if only one bank seemed justified in a community, the wishes of the community regarding the bank which proposes to serve it will also be considered. In addition the incoming branch bank's attitude toward leasing or purchasing of bank property in the community and towards assumption of part or all of the assets and liabilities of the restricted banks in the city will also be given consideration.

While branch banking is provided for now by state and national laws for Oregon, it was evident yesterday that it will not be in operation as soon as its sponsors first announced.

Some rivalry is already apparent between the United States National and the First National groups in Portland, each evidently of the belief that branch banking is in Oregon to stay and each determined that this year marks a crucial time for the Portland banks in securing favorable locations for banks throughout the state.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Mrs. Minnie Hiner of Portland was reelected grand guardian of the Neighbors of Woodcraft in the western jurisdiction at today's session of the quadrennial grand circle meeting here. Mrs. Hiner has held the office since 1923.

Upon recommendation of Mrs. Nora N. Mason of Monmouth, chairman of the salaries committee, the delegates today unanimously endorsed the committee's proposal that no change be made during the coming term in the salaries of paid officers of the order.

## BUILDING PERMITS IN JUNE NUMEROUS

41 per Cent Gain is Shown Over Year ago; March Also is Exceeded

Builders' hopes of an imminent upturn in their industry in Salem were given impetus last night when E. C. Bushnell, city building inspector, announced that building permits during June showed a 41 per cent increase in value over a year ago. In addition, the June gain was 23 per cent above the increase last March, which was the only other month this year showing betterment.

Permits issued during June numbered 68 and had a total value of \$14,611, as against 42 permits with value of \$10,340 in June 1932. Fifteen new buildings were started last month, including four houses. New construction totalled \$6906 and repairs and alterations \$7711. June permits exceeded May permits by \$493.10.

For the six months' period ended yesterday, permits were \$31,336.97 below the corresponding period in 1932.

## COACHING STAFF AT COLLEGE IS LISTED

CORVALLIS, June 30.—(AP)—The coaching lineup for Oregon State college in four major sports, football, baseball, basketball and track, for the coming seasons was announced today by Carl Lodell, director of athletics at the College.

Lon Stiner, Amory T. "Slats" Gill, Jim Dixon, Grant Swann and George Scott are on the coaching staff.

Stiner, who has been assistant football coach here since 1928, will head the football coaching staff. He will be assisted by Jim Dixon, assistant here since 1927, and George Scott, who was coach at Baker high school the past four years.

Slats Gill will be freshman football coach replacing Vern Eilers. Gill will again be head varsity basketball and baseball coach. Scott will coach the frosh basketball and baseball teams.

Swan will relieve Stiner of the duties of head track coach. He also will be in charge of training of all athletes and will be assisted in track by Dixon.

## Second Degree Murder Proven, Humphries Case

EVERETT, Wash., June 30.—(AP)—A superior court jury tonight convicted John Conley Humphries, 40, of Snohomish, of second degree murder for the shotgun slaying of his wife a month ago, as she fled from their home with a baby in her arms.

The jury, during the three-day trial, during which the state had asked the death penalty, while Humphries had pleaded temporary insanity. He faces a sentence which may range from 10 years to life imprisonment.

## Scotch Caddies Capture Dimes
