Appropriations Overdrawn On six Months Basis in Some Departments

separate from the \$15,594 budget for the sheriff's operations. Jail expenditures for the first two months of the Burk administration totaled as much as for the next four months of the six-month period. In the first month the jail account included payments on old bills from the outgoing officer's administration.

Expense of Circuit Court Running High

The circuit court budget is considerably in the red from a six-month proportion of the year's appropriation of \$11,550. All but \$4,185.43 of this total has been expended in the first six months. The bulk of circuit court expenses are in the criminal department.

Heavy Expenses for the Grand Jury and Long-drawn out cases contribute to the rapid use of the appropriation. During this term of circuit court, grand jurors have served 13 days, which has cost the county \$25.

Appropriation for herd inspection has been exhausted, which means dropping this activity until the first of the year. The sum budgeted was \$1,050.

Fund for maintenance and improvement of county property has been overdrawn about \$300, due chiefly to relief work carried on at the Homper county poor farm. Only \$400 was included in the budget for maintenance of county property.

The law library fund, drawn from fees assessed beginning in March, totals \$190.80, of which \$132 has been spent for books.

Rand Returns — Chief Justice John Rand of the state supreme court returned to Salem Thursday from Washington, D. C., where he has spent most of the time during the past two months at the American Law Institute. He reports a brighter outlook in the economic situation in the eastern and middle western states and the people taking a more optimistic view of things. He also commended Senator Charles L. McNary, and stated that the senator was popular with his associates.

Hammond to Woodburn — Rev. Percy Hammond, former Salem young man educated in the high school and Willamette university here, is this week taking over the pastorate of the Methodist church at Woodburn. He has served the last three years as Methodist pastor at Toledo, Ore. Rev. Hammond's father and grandfather were both preachers, his father living in Salem now. For many years Dr. Hammond was a professor in Kimball School of Theology here.

Plane Query Made — Salem airport officials are seeking to learn the identity of one or more persons reported to have heard an airplane flying over southeast Salem the morning of Saturday, June 17, when Pilot William Young of Portland and a passenger disappeared while flying from Medford toward Portland. They stated that Young's father had offered a \$500 reward for his son, dead or alive.

Youth in Charge — The young people of the Calvary Baptist church will have charge of the Sunday night worship there, starting at 8 o'clock. SHELL HEAD HAILS LEADERSHIP OF F. R.

Company Launches new Super Shell Gasoline Without Premium on Price

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30. — Announcing the launching of a new product and the inauguration of a comprehensive advertising and sales promotion campaign in eight western states, Hawaii and British Columbia, G. Leigh-Jones, president of Shell Oil company, today hailed President Roosevelt's leadership and the industrial recovery act, reiterating his words of a year ago that "the way to gain prosperity is to deserve it and to deserve it calls for confidence, vigorous effort and co-operation."

Speaking to thousands of employees in Shell's second annual radio convention, President Leigh-Jones praised President Roosevelt's "encouragement of industry" and declared that his company's recognition of the need for aggressive action a year ago had put more men and money to work at that time and placed Shell "a jump ahead of the field" in capitalizing now on the opportunity created by the administration's "new deal."

And Now Deal Declared

"The fundamental soundness of the efforts we made last year has now been amply confirmed," Mr. Leigh-Jones said. "Shell declared its first new deal a year ago and now, with the roughest part of the going behind us, we are finding our second breath. The new program, launched at the same time as President Roosevelt's policy, will give Shell people a second new deal."

Shell's intensive advertising campaign, built on a strong newspaper schedule and supplementary radio and outdoor advertising efforts will introduce Super Shell, a product described by company executives as "a premium type gasoline at the price of ordinary motor fuels." The new product is a development of exclusive refining processes which eliminate wasteful gasoline fractions and produce a concentrated fuel of maximum efficiency. The announcement said further that "Super Shell was developed in western refineries and introduced in the east where motorists paid millions of dollars in premiums. It is now being offered in the west without the three cents per gallon premium."

The product and campaign were described by Mr. Leigh-Jones and associates, including E. L. Miller, vice-president in charge of marketing; L. T. Kittinger, general manager; E. H. Sanders, advertising manager; and J. W. Miller, vice-president of Shell Service, Inc.

crop has been planted and acreage reduction pledged.

On this basis, Washington growers would receive \$7,900,000; Montana \$8,500,000; Idaho \$5,000,000 and Oregon \$3,900,000.

Wheat growers based the probable compensation on the average production in 1930, 1931 and 1932. For example, Washington's average annual production for this period was 42,000,000 bushels and the allotment will be based on approximately five eighths of that acreage production.

The acreage reduction will apply to this fall's planting of winter wheat and new spring's seeding, and the crop for 1935.

ADVERTISERS VARY ON RECOVERY ACT

Truth in advertising, interdependence of price in advertising with the quality of goods advertised and the effects of the industrial recovery bill upon advertising were the three themes stressed at the Pacific Coast Advertising association's meeting last week in Sacramento, C. A. Sprague, delegate of the club here, reported to the local group at the noon luncheon yesterday at the Gray Hotel.

Diverse views were expressed at the gathering about the industrial recovery act, some speakers viewing the act as one which would stifle competition and thus retard advertising efforts, notably trade association workers, praised the new act highly.

Carl Ramseyer, newly elected president of the Salem Advertising club, was inducted into office, succeeding Mr. Sprague, retiring president.

TEMPERANCE DRAMA PRESENTED SUNDAY

Hall and Summers to Give "The Aftermath", in Park and Church

"The Aftermath", a temperance drama with two characters portrayed by Henry B. Hall and Judge M. Summers, the latter of St. Louis, is to be presented twice in Salem next Sunday as a part of the anti-rape campaign on the 15th amendment being staged in this state. The first showing will be in Willson park at 3 p. m., the second in the First Methodist church auditorium at 8 p. m.

Crowds have viewed the production wherever it has been shown in the state. The two characters are a judge, "Tom Wood" and a saloon keeper, "Tom O'Neil." In the drama an impassioned speech by members who are untrue to their convictions is presented, the saloon keeper bringing about a change in the attitude of the judge and the former's preaching later reacting for his own improvement.

Hall and Summers in the period 1914 to 1918, wrote and produced a successful drama-debate entitled "Wets vs. Drys" and in 1923 to 1927 they wrote a drama-debate "The Judge and the Dope Peddler" and presented it throughout the country.

The present economic distress and the proposed return to liquor, prompted friends of Hall and Summers to persuade them to write a new vehicle which resulted in "The Aftermath" now being presented throughout the country.

their budgets fix up their own currencies the question can stew.

It is the few remaining gold standard nations, headed by France, are going to have to go off, put their currency to sea with the United States and Great Britain and let true levels be found.

However, Mr. Roosevelt is issuing no ultimatum. In fact, he said today he had not been in touch with the struggling economic parley by direct appeal for three days.

As Mr. Roosevelt sees it, the question of temporary stabilization of currency to prevent widespread fluctuations is a problem of banks and not of governments. So involved are the factors that he thinks it totally impossible for a conference to settle the issue within 48 hours or even a week.
