LOS ANGELES, July 1.—(AP)—Heavy Adolph Bowles, 31, one of two men held in Grants Pass, Ore., in connection with the shooting of a state policeman, was arrested in Van Nuys, Calif., police records revealed, on an auto theft charge in November, 1928.

Bowles confessed stealing three other automobiles, police said. Rifles and revolvers were confiscated by authorities when they arrested Bowles and two others of minor age. Bowles was tried and given probation.

He was arrested again in September, 1930 on a charge of tampering with an automobile. His probation was revoked and he was sentenced to San Quentin prison for five years, being paroled April 5, 1932, and discharged from parole a year later.

Authorities said they had no record of John Alvin Barnes, 17, held in Grants Pass with Bowles.

POULTRY BUSINESS IMPROVES RAPIDLY

Egg Prices Rising, Demand
For Young Pullets in
Excess of Supply

Believing that the poultry industry will get back to normal as quickly as any other branch of agriculture and that it is already well on its way, many poultrymen are preparing for increased business this fall and winter.

New laying houses are being constructed and equipped while lumber and other materials may still be bought at very reasonable prices, and almost every commercial poultryman is materially increasing the size of his laying flock as it is predicted that eggs will command a good remunerative price this fall and winter.

True, wheat and other kinds of grain feeds have made spectacular advances lately, but it is anticipated that eggs will advance in price in like proportion.

So great has been the demand for good young commercial pullets that the supply is practically exhausted, which accounts for the unusual demand for late hatched spring and early summer chicks, many of the hatcheries announcing that they will continue operations throughout the season.

Nearly all report unusually good sales this season throughout May and June, owing, no doubt, to the fact that many in order to make the dollar go as far as possible, withheld their orders until the reduced summer and late spring prices for baby chicks went in effect, while many others who were unable to buy young pullets owing to their scarcity, as a last resort, ordered late baby chicks.

Harry H. Collier, licensed poultry judge and expert poultry breeder of Tacoma, Wash., writes that "things are going to be doing in poultry in another year. Thousands have gone back to the land and they will all be in the market for good fowls and the world's fair poultry show, fall fairs and poultry shows will give poultry the desired boost that will sell thousands of eggs for hatching and baby chicks in 1934."

The old saying that "the Lord helps those who help themselves," is as true today as ever, and if the poultrymen will get busy and boost as well as present the merits of their fowls and then money making possibilities through judicious advertising, we can create a demand for standard bred, commercial poultry that will bring prosperity to all who engage in the business, and now is the time to get in on the ground floor while old stock, especially, is very reasonable in price.

ITALY AIR ARMADA ON ITS WAY AGAIN

AMSTERDAM, July 2.—(Sunday)—(AP)—The Italian air armada of 24 sea planes led by General Balbo, minister of aviation, took off at 7:30 a. m., Amsterdam time (1:10 a. m. E. S. T.), on the second leg of their flight from Italy to Chicago.

AMSTERDAM, July 1.—(AP)—Tragedy marked the arrival here today of the Italian air armada of 25 seaplanes en route for Chicago. One of the ships capsized on striking the water, resulting in the death of Sergeant Quintavalle and the injury of three other members of the crew.

General Italo Balbo, the youthful bearded leader of the expedition and Italian air minister, was much distressed at the loss of life which the accident produced.

The Italian squadron made a spectacular arrival here and received a warm welcome. The plane of which Sergeant Quintavalle was engineer, careened as it alighted and the sergeant was suffocated.

WEATHER STATIONS TO BE SHUT DOWN

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—An economy wind hit the weather bureau today and as a result about 23 of its 200 stations shortly will be closed.

A list of stations to be shut down will be announced early next week by the department of agriculture. The number will be limited largely to those situated in small centers and considered the least "essential" by the bureau.

The bureau was required to reduce its expenditures for this fiscal year from \$3,725,000 to \$2,909,000.

Body of Suicide Found Near Here

While plowing near the Willamette river, west of Salem Saturday, C. N. Hathaway discovered the badly decomposed body of a man who apparently had committed suicide. A revolver was found nearby. There were no marks of identification in the man's clothing. He was apparently about 40 years old with dark hair and fairly well dressed. Officers said they had not received any report of missing persons.

NEW CROSS-NATION FLYING RECORD SET

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One, Russell Boardman, holder of the American long distance flying record, set in a flight from New York to Istanbul, lay in an Indianapolis hospital, critically injured by the crash of his ship.

The other two, Lee Gehlbach and Russell Thaw, were forced to drop out early in the race. Thaw broke a wing tip in landing at Indianapolis and a faulty gasoline line put Gehlbach out in an emergency landing near New Bethel, near Indianapolis, leaving only Turner and Wedell to finish the 2500-mile grind.

4045 Meals Served By deMinto Hotel

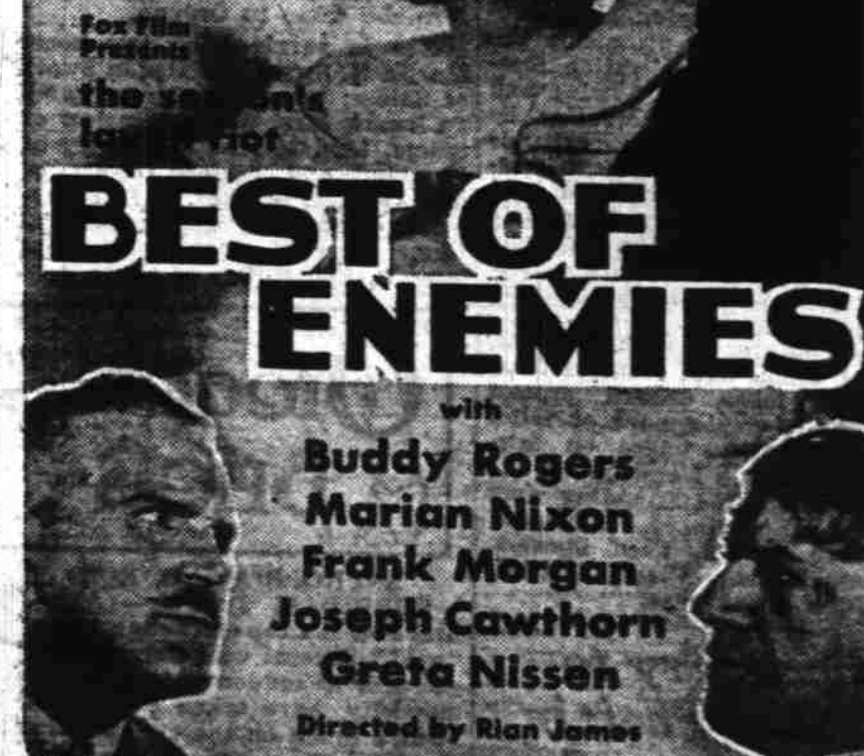
Miss Earhart said she decided somewhere near Amarillo, Tex., to turn back when it appeared she
