SWISS IS HONORED ON 74TH BIRTHDAY

Fred Haslebach Sr. Guest At Family Gathering; Serves Community

HAZEL GREEN, July 4.—Sunday Fred Haslebach Sr., was special guest at a family gathering honoring his 74th birthday. Forty - six years ago Mr. Haslebach came 9000 miles from Switzerland, in Europe, to Switzerland, a small railroad station south of Silverton. His mother and brother, Gottlieb, were of the party.

When the narrator laps into native tongue, German, the American misses some of the most thrilling parts. The mother lived happily for several years with her sons, being laid to rest here. The brother lives at the home.

Mr. Haslebach was married in 1901 to Miss Elizabeth, daughter of George Zielinski. Their children and grandchildren were all present Sunday. Mr. Haslebach has served the community as school director two terms. Mrs. Haslebach was quite active in Parent - Teacher work for a number of years.
