While the farmer is smiling over the rising price of wheat (diagram lower right) after four long years of less than production costs, the city dweller is concerned about rising living costs. Figures just released are shown in the above chart and show May living costs increased more than 3 per cent over April. Compared with 1923 boom prices (100 per cent of chart figures) the cost of living is still considerably lower than ten years ago. Official Washington is driving for wage increases to keep pace with rising commodity prices.

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
