

CANNERY WORK IS SPEEDED UP

First Logans, Raspberries Arrive; Strawberries Nearly Finished

(Continued from page 1) blackberries and prunes will be packed. Reid Murdock and company—Canning cherries, with red and black raspberries and logans going into cans last night for the first time this season. Packed some blings. Will also pack sour cherries. Also handled gooseberry pack and strawberries. Last half of season will see work on usual fruits handled.

Oregon Packing company—Will handle fresh prunes for canning and pumpkins during last half of season; no operation on berries.

Producers cooperative—Taking fruits of members. Another week or 10 days' work on cherries; few logans and black raspberries. Prunes and pears later. Gooseberries and strawberries finished.

Starr Fruit Products company—Making average pack blackberries, still barreling strawberries and ready for red and black raspberries. Prunes later.

Prune prospects are looking a bit brighter than earlier, with some orchardists now reporting they have better crop than they thought a month ago. Market conditions on dried prunes are also better, and the outlook is far ahead of this time a year ago. The carry-over is negligible. The Willamette Prune Growers' association here is receiving some orders right along, particularly from Poland, to which country some shipments have been made this week. Italian business is expected to develop soon. So far there is no talk of prices on the 1933 crop.

HOLLYWOOD ASKS WIDENING JOB AT NORTH APPROACH

Because Peter Barbetzolis, born in Greece, deserted his wife, Stella, two years ago and because she now thinks he is a member of "gangland" in the east, Mrs. Barbetzolis wants a divorce. She filed her complaint Wednesday in circuit court here, setting forth that she met her future husband in Greece in 1930 and was married to him there. He allegedly deserted her in this country in 1931 and she came west to be with friends. She seeks the restoration of her maiden name of Stella Kalogoropoulos.

EPLEY IS NAMED AS TRUSTEE FOR MEMORIAL HOME

Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday appointed Dr. H. C. Epley of Salem as trustee for the Judith Turner Memorial home at Turner, succeeding the Eugene Bible university. The school was established by the late Cornelia A. Davis in 1927 as a refuge for the needy and buildings were provided for the establishment. Subsequently the Eugene institution became financially involved with resulting litigation. In the petition the court was informed that the Eugene university was no longer able to serve competently as trustee.

OLD CAPITAL BANK STRUCTURE HOUSES SHOP SOON, WORD

Work was undertaken yesterday of altering the old Capital National bank building, 129 North Commercial street, to accommodate a new store. The remodeling work includes installation of a new front and improvement of the inside of the structure, according to Jacob A. Rice, owner. SECURITIES SALE REGULATIONS OUT

WASHINGTON, July 5—(AP)—Regulations for protecting the investing public against the sale of worthless securities were completed by the federal trade commission tonight and will be promulgated tomorrow. They are the rules by which the commission will administer the federal securities act for government supervision of interstate sales. The law signed by President Roosevelt May 27 was a major item in his special session program. Along with the regulations, the commission will make public the forms on which any business issuing securities must report a detailed financial statement to the government. It was learned that Baldwin B. Bane, a Virginia democrat, will have charge of the securities division of the commission and serve as active administrator of the law.

Bill in Fischer Case Corrected

Corrected indictments against L. H. Fischer, president of the Fischer Flouring Mills and Fischer Warehouse company of Silverton, were returned by the Marion county grand jury. Fischer on appearing here Monday for arraignment was notified that the grand jury had yet to act on correcting two indictments it returned against him last week. The corrections consist of inserting the price of commodities for whose sale Fischer is charged with larceny by bailee.

July 4 is Most Quiet in Years, Police Verdict

Policemen and firemen Wednesday joined in declaring July 4, 1933, the most quiet Independence day here in many years. No arrests were made, and but one fire, a telegraph pole blaze at 21st and Court streets, occurred. For firemen the pre-Fourth season also was slack, with only one fire alarm rung between July 1 and 4. City police made 12 arrests, 11 for disorderly conduct, during the same period.

Smoke Room at Market on Fire

Buildings at the northwest corner of Commercial and Ferry streets were filled with the odor of burning ham last night when meat in the McDowell Market smokehouse caught fire. The fire department was called out twice within an hour and a half to extinguish flames originating in the smokehouse which is attached to the rear of the market.
