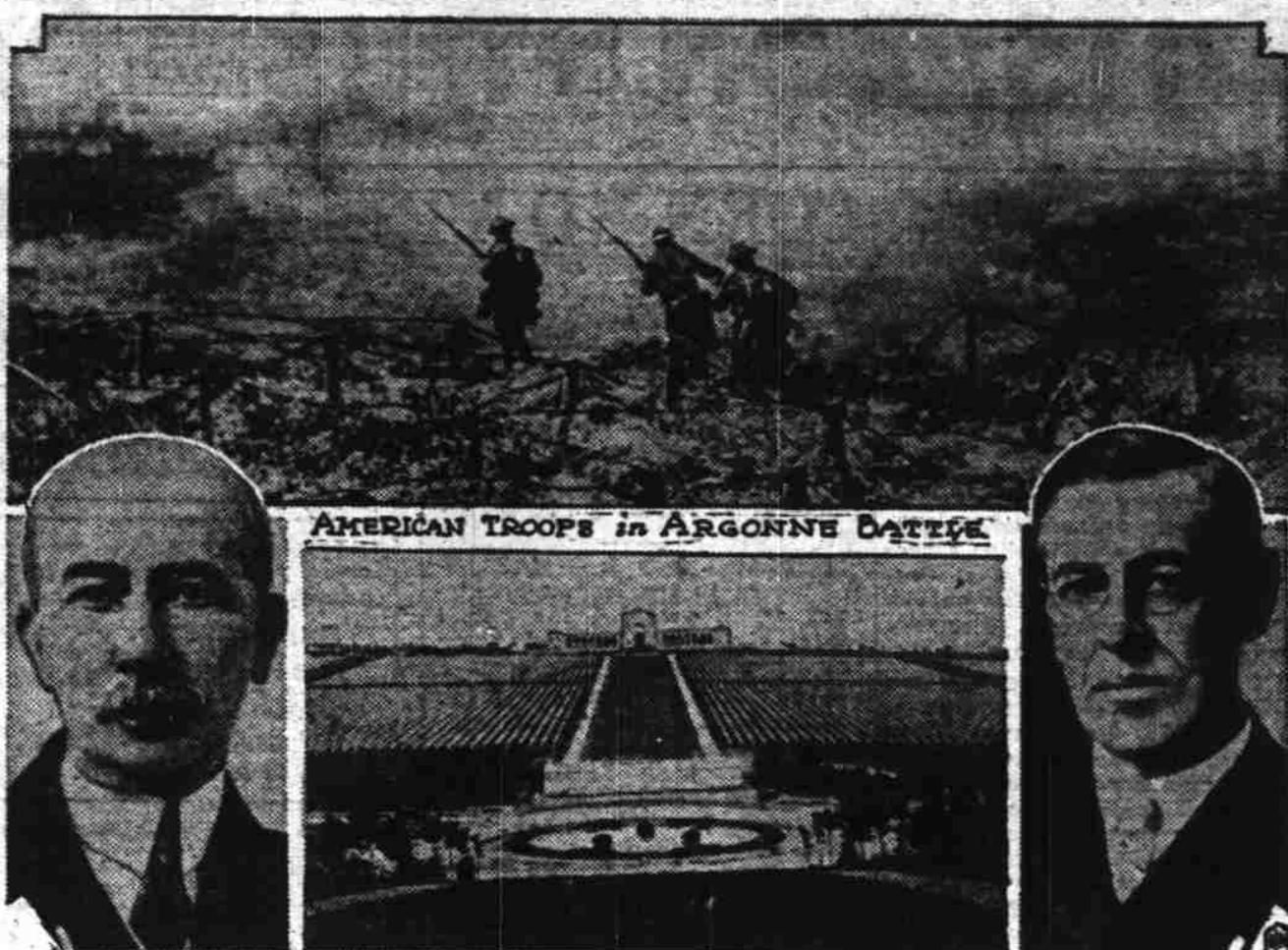

BURIAL PLACE of ARGONNE DEAD

The Late Pres. Wilson

The greatest battle in which American soldiers ever engaged, the Meuse-Argonne drive in September, October and November of 1918, may never have been necessary. This was revealed for the first time in the recent publication by the State Department of a document containing messages that passed between President Wilson and his wartime representative in Paris, Col. E. M. House. The latter reported that the Allies were rejecting peace overtures of the Central Powers while indulging in a bitter squabble over potential spoils. Armistice negotiations were proposed in early October. 117,000 American soldiers were killed or wounded in the Meuse-Argonne drive before the armistice was signed November 11.

11,000 Books Are Borrowed in First Six-Month Period

SILVERTON, July 5.—According to the six month city library report submitted to the city council this week 10,698 books have passed across the circulation desk during the six months ending July 1. Besides this 657 magazines have been lent. During this period 21 new readers signed up for reading cards; 122 books were removed from circulation; 81 books donated; 83 books purchased, 36 books rebound. Names of Power Candidates are Ordered, Ballot

A pro forma decision granting a writ of mandamus against Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, was handed down yesterday by Judge L. H. McMahon here. The writ orders Hoss to place the names of Peter Zimmerman, Morton Tompkins and Albert Slaughter on the July 21 ballot as candidates for state power commissioners. It was agreed upon by counsel for both sides as well as the court that an appeal would be taken at once to the state supreme court. The Security Owners' association was allowed by Judge McMahon to appear as an intervenor in the action.

Special Election To Have 2 Boards

A voting board and a counting board will be provided for in all the larger precincts of the county for the special election July 21. U. G. Boyer, county clerk, said yesterday. Mr. Boyer was undeterred yesterday when the counting board would start work but said he thought it would begin at 1 p. m. Two boards are necessary for early election returns, he said. There are 79 precincts in the county, the same as in the November, 1932, election.

4 HURT IN WRECK; BECKMAN INJURED

INDEPENDENCE, July 5.—Four men were injured Tuesday afternoon when the car in which they were riding failed to negotiate the turn in the road between here and Buena Vista and the car turned over. Fred Barbaness sustained neck lacerations; Paul McLakes, a shoulder injury; Bill Barbaness, broken ribs; and the fourth, name unknown, a broken leg. All are under the care of Dr. Bennett here. Liquor was responsible for the accident, it is said.

L. M. Beckman sustained a broken leg Saturday night at his farm near Independence when he started his car by towing it down hill with his tractor. He was on the tractor and Mrs. Beckman was in the car. She lost control of the car and it smashed into the tractor, throwing him off and catching his leg in the gears. He was taken to the Salem hospital by Dr. Knott. He suffered so from the shock that they were not able to set the leg.

BUSINESS IS SHOWN IMPROVING, SURVEY

NEW YORK, July 5.—(AP)—American business has taken a decidedly upward trend, the New York Board of Trade reported Tuesday on the basis of a survey of conditions in 100 representative cities.

Increases in employment, payrolls, wages, industrial production, wholesale and retail sales, postal receipts, bank clearances, gas consumption and telephones justify the conclusion, the board said.

"The conclusion is inescapable that the depression is over and that we are well on the road to recovery," said Percy C. Magnus, president of the board.

"Business is now in the convalescence stage," he continued. "There may be some setbacks. We all sincerely hope not. If we have them, we believe they will not be serious. We are now probably well on the way to one of the greatest periods of stabilized prosperity in the whole business history of the country."

Millers ambulance was called and conveyed Grover to a McMinnville hospital for treatment. Little is known here as to the cause of the accident. Another of the three Amity boys in the car received a fractured skull. The Giesys were formerly Aurora residents. Grover, Sr., father of the lad, is the youngest of the late Dr. Martin Giesy children.

Weizmann Urged To Unite Jews, Meet 'Emergency'

CHICAGO, July 5.—(AP)—The Zionist organization of America Tuesday called upon Dr. Chaim Weizmann, world Zionist leader, to unite the Jewish race and lead it out of the "present emergency." Dr. Weizmann, formerly president of the world Zionist organization and now head of Hebrew university at Jerusalem, indicated he might accept the leadership. The request was contained in a resolution adopted at the closing session of the American organization.
