

WATER DELINQUENTS TO DO MOWING JOBS

West Salem Council Handles Variety of Business at Last Meet

WEST SALEM, July 6. — At the city council session Monday night, the committee named last month to look into the problem of lowering salaries of city officials reported and it was decided to lay the matter on the table until next month.

The motion prevailed that the street commissioner be empowered to hire men who were delinquent in paying their water bills to mow the vacant lots, the hire to go against the bills and it was also ordered to have grass and weeds along the streets mowed, the price of man and team not to exceed \$5 a day.

George Chapman, chairman of the garden committee requested a stated maximum for expenditures for the city garden and he was empowered to use his own judgment.

The outlet for the main sewer was reported in bad condition due to the fact that the river bank had washed away and it was suggested that Congressmen Mott and McNary be contacted to see what could be done about federal assistance in river control. The street and sewer committees were instructed to ask for this help by and with the aid of the congressmen.

A communication from Leonard Capps asking for a bus franchise was read and the recorder was asked to write to Ray Ferguson, holder of a former franchise, requesting him to appear at a called council meeting to be held later in the week and show reason why his license should not be revoked.

A proposition of getting a federal loan for highway work for the city was referred to a committee consisting of Clarence Guderian, Col. Charles Robertson, Elmer Cook, Fred Gibson and John Friesen.

Courtesy of the floor was extended to Milo Jensen, who asked for a boxing commission be appointed to assist in the boxing and wrestling matches to be held later by the Kingwood post of the American Legion, the legion to construct an arena in West Salem near the Wallace road. The commission named consisted of Milo Jensen, Dr. Arthur Goffrier and V. Harry Wiedmaier.

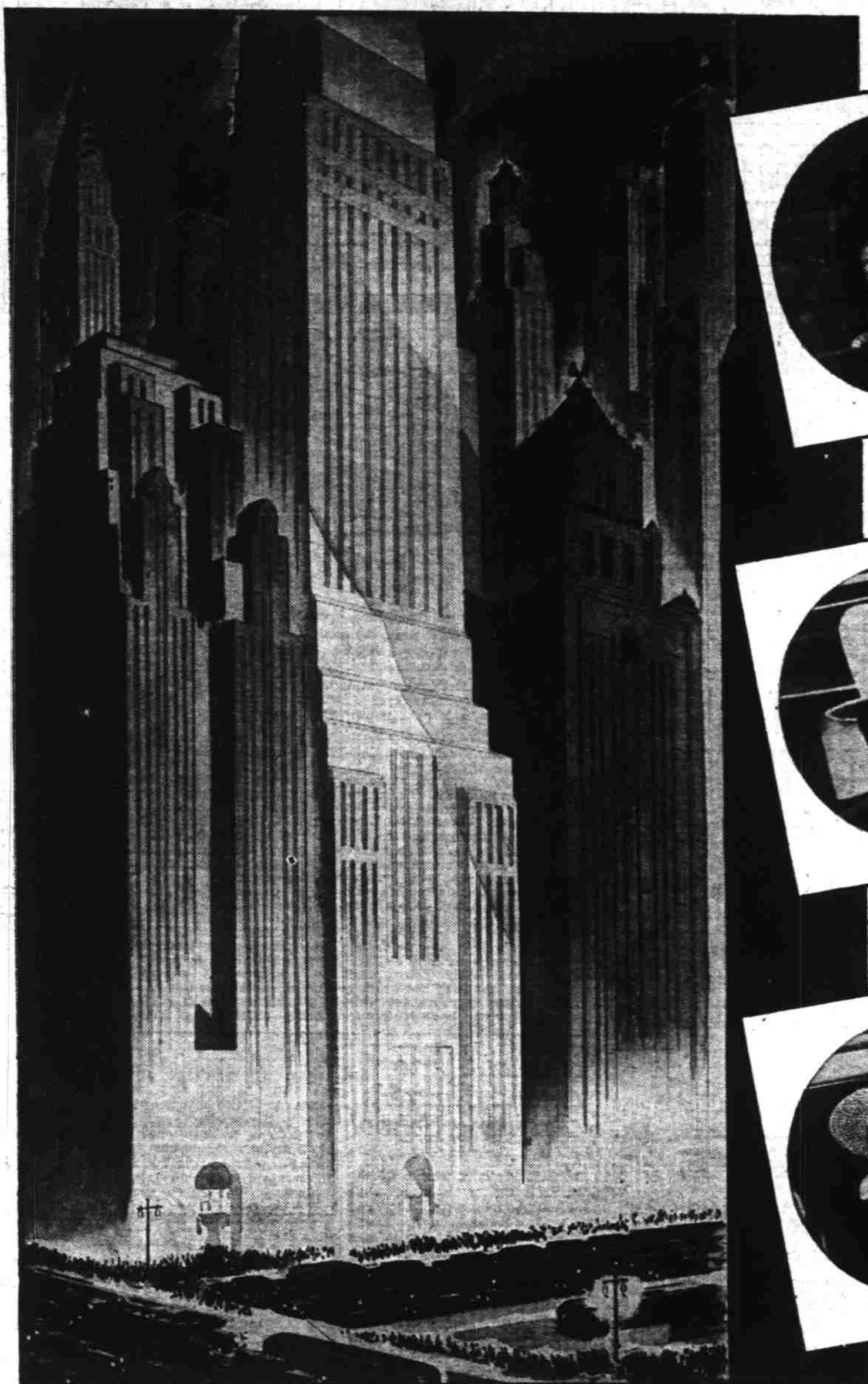

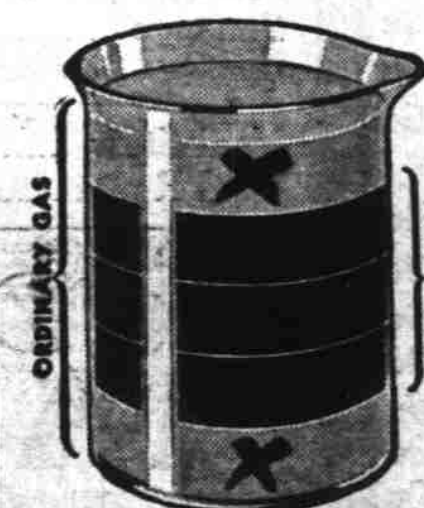
