

Husky Crew Makes Best Time, Only Western Qualifier

THREE EASTERN BOATS IN FINAL

Washington Over 4 Seconds Faster Than Eli; Wind Makes Time Slow

MARINE STADIUM, Long Beach, Calif., July 7.—(AP)—The east rose in all its might today to qualify three crews to one for the west in the elimination races for the national intercollegiate spring championship here tomorrow over the 2000-meter course inaugurated a year ago by the Olympic games.

Running true to expected form, Yale captured the first heat in six minutes 44.3 seconds, trailed by Cornell, a scant length in the wake of the Eli opponents.

Meeting the challenge of the eastern eight, Washington's Huskies, Pacific coast champions, came back to the defense of the west winning the second heat in the best time of the afternoon, six minutes 40 seconds.

Finishing with a terrific sprint to cross the line four lengths ahead of the flashing crimson oars of Harvard.

The University of California at Los Angeles, rowing in its second intercollegiate race of its career, made a surprising first heat with the Crimson, battling bow to bow until the finish when Harvard's superior stamina enabled it to capture the fourth qualifying position by two lengths over the Bruins.

A sharp wind which whipped diagonally over the course from the southwest slowed times appreciably. Washington's mark was ten seconds slower than its winning time here April 15 when the Huskies captured the Pacific coast title in six minutes 30 seconds.

It was also considerably slower than the course records of six minutes 28.2 seconds established during the Olympic games last summer by Italy.

Yale was in complete command of the first race in expected fashion, starting out in front and relinquishing the lead only momentarily during the first part of the 2000 meter sprint.

Washington was even more superior over its opponents. The Huskies never stepped their stroke above the cadence of the low thirties and apparently put on their finishing spurt for effect.

Wood, Shute Face British Open Playoff

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 7.—(AP)—For the tenth successive year, the golfing shotmakers from the United States dominate the British open golf championship finals today over St. Andrews' classic terrain but whether the title honors go to Craig Wood, the powerful blond from New Jersey, or to dark, slender Densmore Shute, the Philadelphia stylist, will not be known until they play out their tie at 36 holes tomorrow.

Crashing through in one of the fiercest, most exciting battles ever waged for this ancient championship, while favorites were eliminated right and left by St. Andrews' famous hazards, Wood and Shute finished in a deadlock at 292 strokes each for the 72 holes of championship conflict. Wood's dazzling 68 on his third round this morning was his decisive thrust, the best score of the day, and his tally showed successive rounds of 77-72-68-75. Shute had four 73s in a row, even par on every round, for one of the most consistent exhibitions ever witnessed.

Like the Ryder cup matches, however, the leaders were not safe until the last putt was hit by the last player, who, at Southport, was Syd Easterbrook. "Syd the saviour" they called him after he beat Shute on the home green in the deciding match of the international team series. But the countryman from Bristol failed today, like a dozen others, to come through in the stretch drive. His final putt failed to drop and instead of a three-cornered playoff, two young Americans with contrasting games and personalities will wage the first playoff since Jack Hutchinson whipped Roper Wethered in the 1921 open.

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
