HAYING UNDER WAY IN TWO COUNTIES

Alfalfa Brings \$8.50 ton; Wheat Harvest Looms; Baling is Started

Haying in Marion and Polk counties is well under way, and although the crop is lighter than usual the harvest will probably not more than anticipated earlier. While there is no fall grain, spring oats and wheat are turning out well. Wheat is beginning to turn and harvest of this grain will likely start before long. First barley is being cut.

Much of the hay crop is clover and alfalfa, though some grass is being cut. A quantity of spring oats will be cut for hay this season, due to the shortage caused by the winter freezes. The first baling reported in operation in the two counties will start this morning on the Frank Farmer farm near Oak Grove, where about 100 tons of hay will be baled.

While the market on new crops is quiet from the grain and hay dealer standpoint, reports of individual purchases in the fields are coming in already. One grower has sold 50 tons of alfalfa, not top grade, at \$8.50 in the stack, which with baling costs of \$2.35 per ton will mean \$10.85 per ton to the buyer.

Some alfalfa clover has been bought at \$9.50, in the field, and some farmers are willing to take \$10 in the shock.

No estimates on production in this area are available yet.

SPEED REQUIRED IN REQUESTS FOR LOAN

If Oregon's irrigation and drainage districts are to receive federal aid under the emergency farm loan act, it will be necessary to expedite the applications as no loans will be made after January 23, 1934, C. E. Stricklin, secretary of the state reclamation commission, was advised Monday.

The loans for refinancing of irrigation and drainage districts will be based on appraisals to be made by the government. Before any loans are approved directors of the districts and creditors will have to sign an agreement that they will accept such appraisal. The loans would be secured either by notes or bonds. Stricklin said that approximately 20 irrigation and drainage districts already have filed applications for loans with the reconstruction finance corporation, and that several others will be added to the list within the next two weeks.

Bridge Entirely Open—Sunday traffic enjoyed a straight shoot through the new highway bridge at Jefferson, instead of the detour which has been in effect for many weeks. The bridge itself has been open for more than a week, but the northern approach has just been cleared for traffic.

Reckless Driving—F. R. Randle admitted a reckless driving charge when hauled into justice court yesterday, and Judge Hayden assessed a fine of \$25 and costs. The fine was remitted.

STATE SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 18

EUGENE, Ore., July 10. — The University of Oregon, Oregon State college and state normal schools at Ashland, Monmouth and La Grande, will open for the coming school year on September 18, according to a bulletin on entrance information just issued by the division of information of the state system of higher education here. All freshmen will report to the university and state college for "freshman week" at this time. Old students will register at the university on September 20 and at the college on September 23.

All normal school students will report on September 18, with the first two days given over to placement tests and registration. The medical school in Portland will open September 23.

The bulletin, which may be obtained from the registrars of any of the institutions, contains full information on freshman week, placement and other examinations, admission requirements, fees and deposits, board and room, housing regulations, student costs, prospects for self-support and student loan funds.

BENTS SELLS HOPS AT 57 CENTS POUND

Purchase of the H. L. Bents hop crop of 146 bales by Horst at 57 cents late last week marks the first hop sales here in over 10 days.

The Bents crop sold at nine cents under the last previous sales. The lower market price is said to be influenced by New York market conditions, for in the eastern center brewers who have so far been unable to secure their permits for operation have been throwing their hop holding upon the market. Foreign hops, though inferior to the coast offerings, also have had some effect.

Contract business, while slower, holds up fairly well in price. Some one year contracts are being written at 50 cents and three year contracts on a 50-35-30 cent basis.

LEGAL POINTS STILL DARK OVER ELECTION

Referendum on Power Bill, Commissioner Ballot Yet to be Settled

Although only 11 days remain until the special election July 21 there are a number of legal matters to clear up before the ballots can be printed and placed at the disposal of the voters.

One of these involves the candidacy of Peter Zimmerman, Morton Tompkins and Dr. A. Slaughter, who are seeking the three jobs of state power commissioners under the grange power law. These men filed their declarations of candidacy several weeks ago but the supreme court later refused to take jurisdiction in a mandamus proceeding to compel the secretary of state to place their names on the special election ballot. In the meantime a referendum was filed against the entire state power commission act.

Following refusal of the supreme court to assume jurisdiction in the mandamus proceeding a similar suit was filed in the Marion county circuit court. Judge McMahon, after hearing the arguments, signed a temporary injunction from which appeal was taken to the supreme court. Final arguments in this proceeding will be heard by the supreme court today. Attorney General VanWinkle will appear for the state.

VanWinkle will argue that the grange power act, had it not been subjected to referendum, would not have become a law until June 9, while candidates for the new power commission, had to file prior to May 31, or several days before the office was created.

The referendum on this law will not appear on the ballot at the special election unless the supreme court, in its opinion on the mandamus, makes a ruling on the other.

State department officials also were concerned Monday because of the failure of four counties to report their registration figures for the special election. David O'Hara, legal adviser for the secretary of state, estimated that the total registration for the special election would be approximately 10 per cent less than that for the general election last November. He said he based this estimate on figures received from 32 of the 36 counties.

County School Meet to Close Wednesday Night

Addresses by prominent educators, committee reports and discussion of 4-H club work by H. C. Seymour, state club leader, featured Monday's sessions of the Oregon County School Superintendents' association. The conference will continue until Wednesday night.

The address of welcome was given by C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, while Josiah Wills discussed "Accomplishments of Past County School Superintendents' Conferences."

The session will be held at the chamber of commerce there, and will be attended by representatives of the Salem shops.

HIGHWAY WIDENING BIDS OPENED TODAY

Brooks - Aurora Section on Commission's Schedule; Estimate is \$260,000

Awarding of contracts for widening and resurfacing the Pacific highway between Aurora and Brooks, readjustment of federal highway fund allocations to comply with government regulations, and presentation of secondary road matters by county delegations, will feature today's meeting of the state highway commission in Portland.

Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the commission, announced that another conference with the bureau of public roads and the forest department would be necessary as the result of new regulations and specifications sent out by the federal government in connection with the public works bill. Allocations previously adopted will have to be changed because of these regulations, Scott said.

The commission also will consider proposed new locations of state highways within Klamath Falls and Oregon City. Delegations from each city have requested an appearance before the commission.

Improvement of the Brooks-Aurora section of the Pacific highway will be made in three units. Bids for this work were rejected

at a previous meeting because they were too high. Engineers estimated the cost of this improvement at \$280,000.

Highway officials said the work of widening and resurfacing the Pacific highway would be completed before October 1.

GOSS ON TRIAL IN COURT HERE TODAY

Trial of O. H. Goss, agitator arrested on the courthouse grounds here recently on a disorderly conduct charge, will open in justice court this morning at 10 o'clock.

The case was to have opened Wednesday, although being set at one time for today. It goes back to today because the district attorney's office, which had been expected to be tied up today in circuit court, was released from that duty when Loren Hall pleaded guilty yesterday and was sentenced on the charge for which trial had been slated for today.

It is estimated the Goss trial will take three days.

Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden will sit on the trial, and evidence will be heard by a jury of six men.
