DECISION DUE UPON ELECTION DISPUTES

The state supreme court today will hand down an opinion in the mandamus proceeding filed recently by Peter Zimmerman, Morton Tompkins and Dr. A. Slaughter, candidates for state power commissioners under the grange power law, to compel the secretary of state to place their names on the ballot at the special election July 21.

This was announced following arguments of attorneys before the court here Tuesday. Plaintiffs contended that they filed their declarations of candidacy within the time required by law and it was incumbent upon the secretary of state to refer their names to the voters at the special election.

Attorney-General Van Winkle argued that the entire grange power act was under referendum attack, which precluded the election of the power commissioners until it was referred to the voters.

AWAIT BANK ACTION BY U. S. ATTORNEY

Any legal action regarding the establishment of branch banks in Oregon without permission of state authorities must come through the office of the United States attorney in Portland, state officials said yesterday.

Both the attorney-general's office and the state banking department are of the opinion that branch banks cannot be legally established in Oregon without state permission. Several branches have been thus established.

The attorney-general's office contends the Glass-Steagall act requires national banks to meet all state requirements in creation of branches. Violations of the law, however, would be prosecuted by federal authorities.

The comptroller of the treasury's office is being notified by state officials that Oregon's statutory requirements have not been met in the establishment of branches recently.
