

# Local News Briefs

**Baker, Wasco Report**—All counties in Oregon with the exception of Grant have filed their registration figures for the special election July 21 with the secretary of state. Baker and Wasco counties sent in their registration figures Wednesday. Baker county reported a total registration of 7362, including 3800 Republicans and 3500 Democrats. The Baker county registration for the special election decreased 926 when compared with the registration figures for the general election in November, 1932.

## THOMAS TO AID IN WATER PLANT STUDY

Charles M. Thomas, utilities commissioner, yesterday sent word to the Salem city council, pledging his office's cooperation in the valuation of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company's plant here. The council recently asked Thomas to make a valuation on the local plant.

Thomas requested the council to bring its own 1931 valuation down to date and then to submit the valuation to his engineers for consideration. Thomas pointed out that his office was limited in funds available for investigation and said his engineering staff could compare and check the estimates of value placed on the plant here.

The last complete valuation of the water system by the state in Salem, was made in 1914.

## SUPERINTENDENTS ELECT BRUMBAUGH

### Seymour Lauded for Club Program; Effort Pledged To Vitalize Schools

T. F. Brumbaugh of The Dalles was elected president of the Oregon county school superintendents association at the closing session of its annual conference Wednesday. He succeeds Josiah Willis of Polk county. A. N. Cannon of Toledo was elected vice president and Katherine McRae of Oregon City, secretary.

Outstanding speakers at yesterday's sessions included Harriet V. Long, state librarian; Robert J. Maaske of the state educational department, and Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner.

A committee composed of Maybelle H. Romig, Baker county; E. A. Sayre, Union county, and J. A. Yeager, Umatilla county, submitted a report on "suggestions to meet emergency conditions." A number of resolutions were adopted at the afternoon session.

One of these lauded H. C. Seymour, state club leader, and the members of his staff. The work of the textbook and course of study committee also received favorable comment.

"We recognize that no institution dealing with human material can ever attain perfection," another resolution read. "Among the imperfections of education throughout its history has been its tendency to formalize and de-vitalize the materials with which it deals. The outstanding element in the modern philosophy of education is vitality. Biology must look out of doors. Civics must look at the state house, city hall and city water supply. Literature must look at books and the characters walking through them rather than at the grammatical form in which thoughts are expressed."

The association pledged its best efforts to make the schools institutions of life and vitality through which boys and girls will be brought into contact with those life problems that are within their comprehension.
