

MAJORITY OF CAMP BOYS ARE CATHOLICS

Stayton Priest Holds Mass In Santiam Sections; Boys Glad to Come

STAYTON, July 12—Rev. Father Jos. Scherbring left here Saturday afternoon in one of the C. C. trucks for Camp 617, which is located near the Black Eagle mine on the Little North Fork. At 7:30 Sunday morning he said mass there after which he was taken to Mehama by L. Wheeler and there they met a truck from Camp 619, located on Humburg creek, near the Brettenbush hot springs. They reached the camp, so that mass was celebrated there at 11:45.

These camps are a distance of 55 miles apart. 70 per cent of the men at 619 are Catholics and 60 per cent of the men at No. 617 are also Catholics. These men are all from Chicago. Mass was said at the latter camp for the first time this past Sunday in the large mess hall, which is 160 feet long. Prior to this mass had been said in the open air.

Father Scherbring states that there is always an exceptionally large and attentive attendance at the services he has been holding in these camps, and that the young men are most eager to assist him in the capacity of altar boys.

Father F. Scherbring of Sublimity has also visited the above mentioned camps, and conducted services for the men.

Cougars Get Mother Of 2 Deer Now Tame And Pets of Kimseys

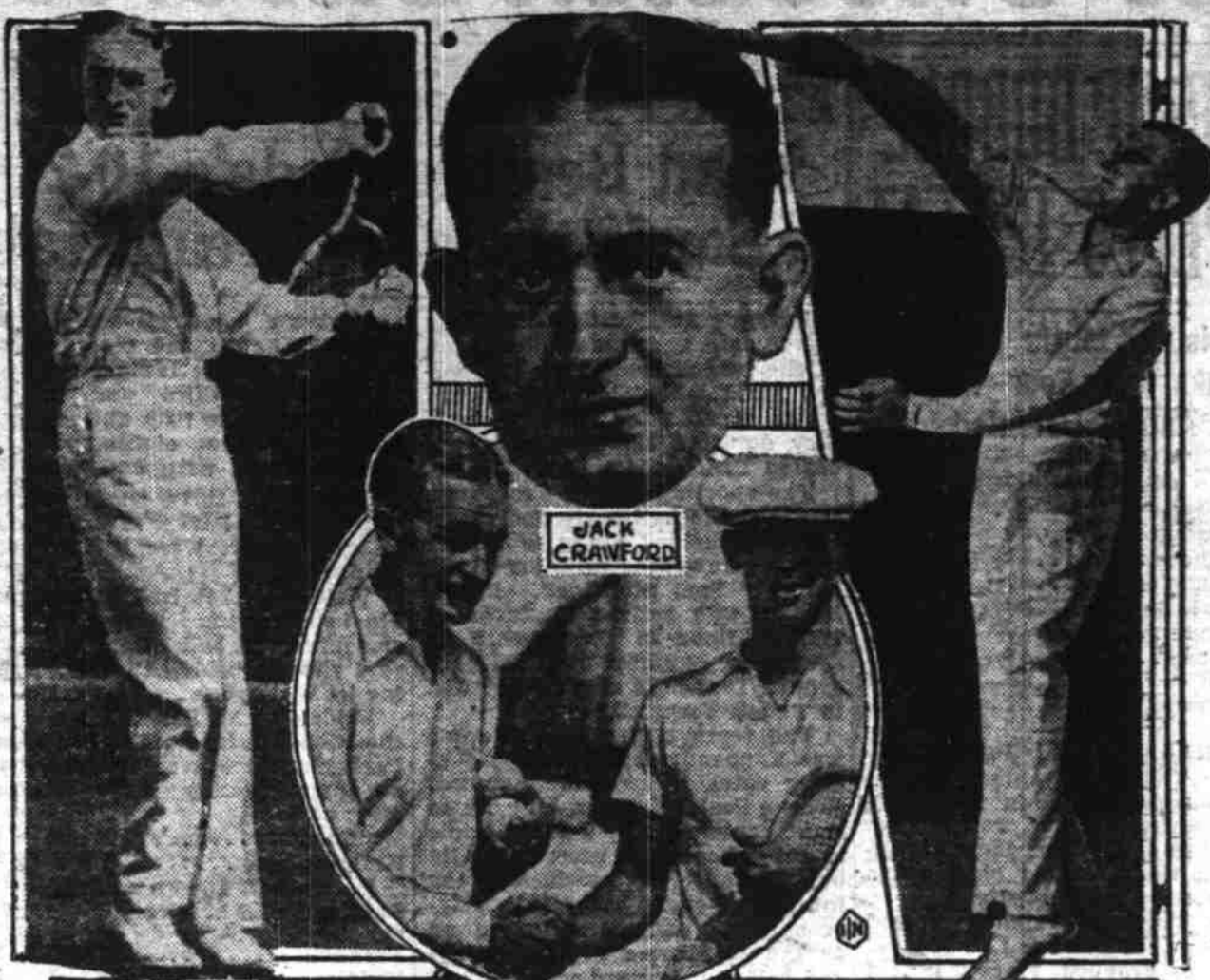

FERNALD TEACHING METHOD IS STUDIED

MT. ANGEL, July 12—A group of teachers consisting of Sister M. Gregory, Sister M. Bernadette, Sister M. Catherine, Sister M. Andrea, Miss Helen Keber and Miss Theresa Dehler, all students of Mt. Angel Normal summer school, attended the clinic school under Dr. Debusk at the University of Oregon at Eugene Tuesday.

The school is directly under Dr. Grace Fernald of the University of Southern California, who teaches classes of children of all grades who have been found incapable of learning by the regular method. Dr. Fernald has devised a method of her own to teach these children, which has proven successful. She is at present writing a book explaining the system.

The sisters wish to make use of Dr. Fernald's method in their mission school and Miss Dehler and Miss Keber, teachers of St. Mary's public school of Mt. Angel, are studying the system so that it can be used for several special pupils in their school. En route the teachers also visited at Oregon State college.

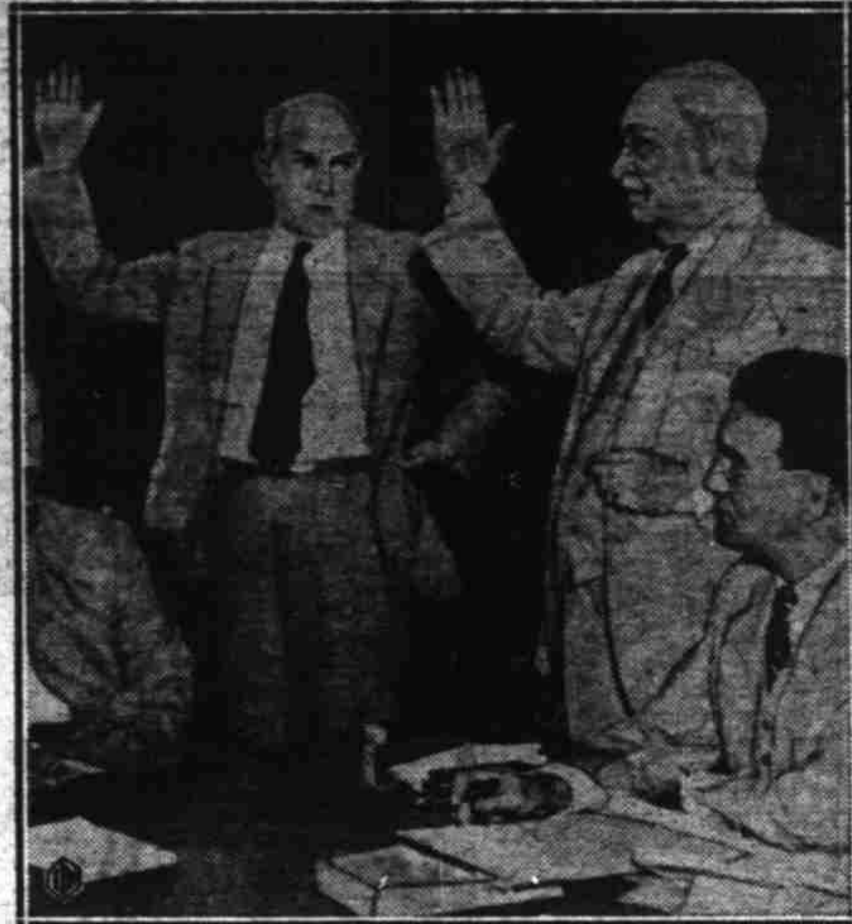

Falls Highway is Nearly Complete

The South Silver Creek Falls highway will have been completed by the end of this month, Hedda Swart, county engineer, opined Tuesday. Swart said 10 trucks are now busy hauling crushed rock from Stayton to the road, a

secondary highway, which completes the gap in the loop trip to the falls. The grading work on the three and one-half mile gap is nearly completed. Swart said he would try to have the road smooth and readily passable by the time the park dedication is held July 23.

KELSO RELIEF TAGS TO BE SOLD FRIDAY

The Kelso flood relief campaign in Salem, originally scheduled for last week, will be conducted under the auspices of the Red Cross Friday and Saturday of this week, with the cooperation of representatives of virtually all the service clubs in the city. Sixty women dressed as Red Cross nurses will sell tags on the streets and visit all business establishments.

Salem's quota for the relief of flood sufferers at Kelso, Wash., where the flood caused by the breaking of a dike has not yet wholly subsided and where hundreds were rendered homeless, is \$1200.

OREGON DESCRIBED AS ONE-TIME LAKE

The geological history has been unfolded, McNab said, through the remains of the earlier days discovered in various sections of the state.

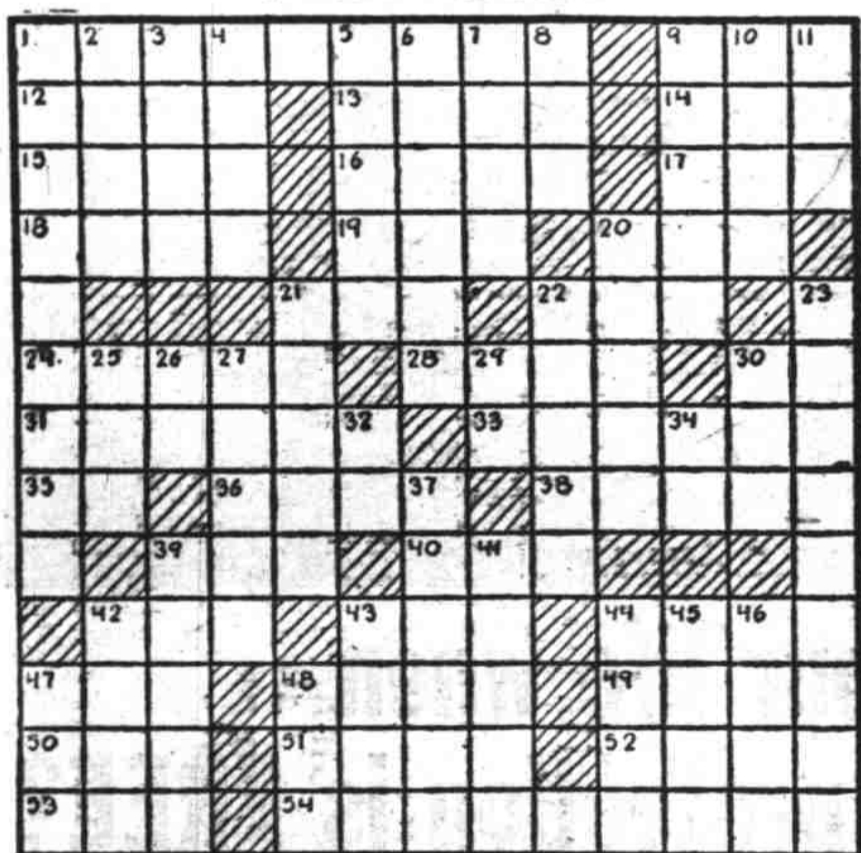
Oregon in its earlier geological days consisted of two great islands, one in the eastern and one in the southern part of the present state. Most of the state, McNab averred, was covered with shallow water and great reptiles lived here. The coast line was broad and swampy.

The speaker discussed the means in which various mountains were formed, many by volcanic action.

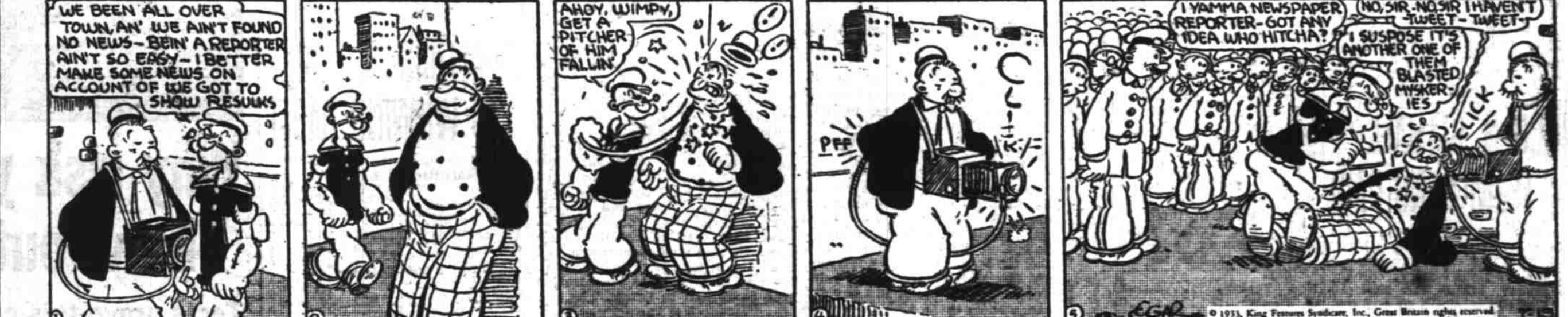
