There is again growing sugges-tion in the trade for a reversal of buying prices on butterfat to be based upon standard grade cube prices instead of extras as recently. Up to a short time ago all butterfat values here were established on the basis of standard Onions, Calif., cwt. Rhubarb, focal grade cubes inasmuch as the bulk of the make is of that sort.
