Salem's fire loss last year was \$8.21 per capita, in contrast with the national average of \$2.22, the English average of 85 cents and the Canadian average of \$2.52, Dr. O. A. Olson, city alderman, stated yesterday, quoting a report to the national board of fire underwriters to show why he believed a fire prevention bureau should be set up here. Dr. Olson, chairman of the council fire committee, assisted by City Attorney Chris Kowitz, is now preparing an ordinance establishing such a bureau. Twenty-seven per cent of pres-

ent fire losses is strictly preventable and 25 per cent partly preventable, the report to the underwriters asserts. "In 1930, 64 municipalities

The state banking department's office yesterday said that in many instances the restrictions, enforced since the March banking holiday, would be continued.
