possible to reach water with heavy pumping apparatus.

While the letter "congratulates the responsible party for having dug a ditch known as Canoe canal... sufficient in size to reservoir ample water to protect the south half of these grounds but of no concern to the stock barns and sheds," it finds the canal "now dry, which should, by all means, have a reasonable amount of water in it during the dry summer seasons."

For additional water supply, doubling that at present, the letter recommends that the water main at 17th and Market streets be extended and connected with the fairgrounds system. One standard hydrant with outlet large enough for the fire pumps, the letter suggests, should be installed at each of six strategic locations, including two near the stock barns.

The final recommendation is that all buildings be equipped with "first aid fire protection."

"State property is under the fire protection of the Salem department as well as the portion of the city exposed by this property; therefore, we feel justified in making" these recommendations, the letter explains.

Silver Falls Dedication to Launch Program Promoting Oregon Scenic Attractions

Editor's Note: This article was prepared for The Statesman by Dr. David Bennett Hill, chairman of the Kiwanis club committee sponsoring the Silver Falls park picnic and dedication Sunday, July 23.

The civic and service clubs of Marion county are sponsoring a program to call attention to the value of the scenic attractions of Oregon in the dedication of Silver Falls state park, Sunday, July 23. Oregon scenery, the value of which can scarcely be over-estimated, is easily our second largest industry; and it is the only industry which can be enjoyed over and over again and remain in possession of and grow in value to the owner.

These figures are interesting: Our lumber industry in 1931 brought us 43 million dollars, our salmon industry over 6 1/2 million, our fruit industry a little over 6 million. The tourists left in Oregon that year 33 million dollars in cash with very little effort on our part.

What has Oregon for tourists and what does it cost the state to make it available? In the last 16 years, the state highway commission has supervised the building of over 5000 miles of magnificent highways in Oregon, costing the state approximately 169 million dollars.

These highways were built for beauty as well as for convenience, and one can ride with comfort and view mountain, river and valley scenery which will captivate the imagination and linger in the memory.

Two of these highways, the Pacific and Bend - California, run parallel with two mountain ranges 400 miles across the state in view of 11 snow capped mountains, through two national parks; over one of the narrowest and deepest river gorges in the world, ice and marble caves and innumerable lakes and rivers.

Another highway, the Oregon Coast highway follows the rugged Oregon coast over 400 miles. It is the longest stretch on the continent where mountains come down to meet the sea. Another, the Columbia River highway, runs along the famous Columbia river 215 miles through the Columbia gorge and reigns supreme as the world's greatest highway.

Another, the Mount Hood Loop highway, entirely circles Mount Hood which is known as America's most beautiful mountain and the only mountain over 10,000 feet entirely circled by an improved highway. Another highway 7000 feet high and 34 miles long circles the rim of Crater lake and is easily one of the scenic drives of the world. On one side one looks down 1000 feet into the unbelievably blue water and on the other side one sees a panorama of the Oregon Cascades. Another highway extends from Salem and circles the Silver Falls state park, where in a radius of two and one-half miles there are 10 falls ranging from 35 feet to 200 feet in height. They are in deep wooded canyons among over - hanging cliffs with a background of green. The park is one of nature's beauty spots.

Eastern Oregon's Attractions Reached

Another, the McKenzie highway, extends from Eugene to Bend in eastern Oregon, along the beautiful McKenzie river and over the Oregon Cascades.

Another highway extends from Pendleton over the Blue mountains to Walla Walla, the Switzerland of America. Also, the John Day highway from Arlington to Baker and Ontario, has a variety of beautiful scenery.

The following beautiful highways under construction will be completed in the near future and compare favorably with any in

the entire country for scenic attraction. The North and South Santiam highways which will cross the Cascade mountains, make two more connecting links between eastern and western Oregon. Another beautiful pass along the foothills of the Blue mountains extends from Pendleton via Ukiah to John Day.

To add to this natural beauty, the state has purchased or has had given to her by public minded citizens, over 100 parks consisting of about 12,000 acres. These are the beauty spots of Oregon and they are being improved in places of still greater beauty by the Oregon highway commission.

Our national government is also aware of the great beauty and what it means to the future of the country. It has set aside 230,000 acres located in five counties, Baker, Linn, Walla, Jefferson, Marion and Klamath, which it expects to make in time a veritable paradise for sportsmen and campers with the numerous lakes planted with fish and the wild animals propagated and protected by law.

Two National Parks Situated in Oregon

The national government also maintains two national parks, the Oregon Caves, 480 acres, and Crater Lake National park, 159,000 acres.

In addition to this, scientists tell us that some of the greatest fossil beds in the world are here in Oregon. All over this valley and parts of eastern Oregon are fossils of prehistoric animals that lived here ages ago when this was a tropical region. The burial mounds of sun-worshippers can be traced through this state into Mexico, where the first stone pyramid was built. Scientists state that this might have been the beginning of the pyramids. This state is filled with historic spots which had much to do with the settling of the entire country west of the Rocky mountains. The Indian stories and legends of Crater lake, Mount Mazama, Mount Multnomah, the Bridge of the Gods and of others are the most fascinating of the entire globe. Nature's wonders are so common here that inhabitants pay little attention to them and outsiders tell us that our 43 million acres of forests covered with lakes and rivers are the greatest recreation area of the world, where prince and pauper can roam the mountains and fish the streams with the inalienable rights to the pursuit of happiness, with love for beauty, love for nature, with respect for all the Creator made, and with a kindly feeling towards all mankind.

In the Capital National when the coins and papers were set in the tin box that day in 1892. The two coins, he believes, were counterfeits the bank had chased upon.

"I had been in the Capital National bank seven years then," he said. "I started in 1885 as janitor at a salary of \$1.50 a week. My father, John H. Albert, in 1892 was head cashier. The president, I think, was Paul Wallace's father, R. S. Wallace, who came here from Chicago, started the bank, built Salem's first cannery, set out the largest pear orchard, across the river, built Wallace road and acquired the Salem Water company. Dr. W. A. Cusick succeeded Mr. Wallace as president of the bank."

Joseph Albert later became assistant cashier of the Capital National, and cashier of the First National bank, formed from the Capital National in 1922. He was with First National when it moved from the old building to the present Livestock structure at State and Liberty streets.

Mr. Sroat, bookkeeper and messenger for the Capital National bank in 1892, is now in Portland where he conducts an insurance business.

Aside from removal of the two granite pillars, giving a wider opening, the front of Capital National building will be little changed, according to Jacob Rise, owner. Except for minor changes, the inside will be left as it is at present. The oddly shaped bank safe at the rear will not be removed, he says.

DRYS HERE MAKING THOROUGH CANVASS

Dry interests in Marion county have not been resting on their oars during the campaign actively waged by wets although they have purposely carried on quiet warfare. A house to house canvass in which an attempt was made to contact every voter in his home was completed before registration books were closed to check up on unregistered voters and to test the humidity of the vote.

Backing the activities of the prohibitionists of the county is a united group of dry organizations combining the Allied Youth groups, the W. C. T. U., the county Christian Federation and the individual churches.

The group is favoring no change in any law, federal, state or city and its workers are making a decided effort to determine where every dry vote in the county is to be found and to see that all dry votes are cast.

one time operated 10 steamboats on the Willamette and Columbia rivers. David McCully became president of that concern, and under his management it prospered and was, in fact, the greatest of all influences in building up the Salem of that time.

Estelle Ann McCully, coming when a girl of nine, lived all the rest of her life here; the last three years with her daughter, Agnes Gilbert Schucking, wife of B. O. Schucking, on route 2, in the home that was the residence of the late Isaac L. Patterson while he was governor of Oregon. On April 27, 1871, she was married to A. N. Gilbert, who became a partner of I. L. Patterson, under the firm name of Gilbert & Patterson, merchants. Mr. Gilbert was at one time postmaster of Salem, and at another superintendent of the Oregon penitentiary. He died seven years ago.

Besides Mrs. Schucking, the children are Ray David Gilbert of Salem and Warren Gilbert of Los Angeles, the last named nationally known as a cartoonist. Frank David McCully, a brother, lives at Joseph, Oregon. The funeral will be held at the Rigdon mortuary at 10:30 Monday, July 17, Rev. W. C. Kantner officiating, thence to the Mount Crest Abbey mausoleum.

On July 4 of last year, observing the 83rd birthday of Mrs. Gilbert, the McCully clan held a reunion at Harborside. There were present two survivors of the 1852 covered wagon company of the family, the other one being Mrs. Alice Crane, daughter of Asa McCully, who passed away last December at her home in Beverly Hills, California. There are numerous living members of the McCully clan.

School District Funds Warrants

Salem school district has retired \$19,748.98 in warrants marked "not paid for lack of funds" plus \$598.98 interest in the last few weeks, it was announced at the school clerk's office yesterday. There were 210 warrants in the lot called, the oldest issued December 14, 1932. The amount of warrants outstanding cannot be ascertained until the annual audit now being made is completed.

"Despite some rather loud voices raised in criticism of the policy of the present British government there has been ample indication, satisfactory to its members, in recent bye-elections that it is generally acceptable," the informant said.

"There is a tremendous amount of money released every month in the dole alone. Just consider that 50,000,000 pounds (currently \$238,500,000) goes every month just to meet rents. This money is spent in villages and towns. There can't be much dissatisfaction over here as long as this is the case."

The body of Frank Stankiewicz, who Tuesday night barricaded himself in the sheriff's quarters on the second floor of the Linn county jail, and shot it out with state, county and city officers, was cremated at the Oregon State hospital here Friday.

Stankiewicz was received at the hospital early in June from Curry county. He escaped from the institution last Monday.

Officials said that Stankiewicz died from the effects of gas bombs and not from bullet wounds.
