Schramm Files Semi-Annual Report, Scotts Mills, Hubbard, Aurora

Six months' reports on the li-quidation of the state banks at Aurora, Hubbard and Scotts Mills were filed in circuit court here Friday. A. A. Schramm, state bank superintendent, is in charge of the liquidations which followed closures in 1932. The period reported on was from November 15. 1932 to May 15, 1933.

The Aurora State Bank liquidaion showed total receipts of \$9485 for the six months, \$1567 being received on interest and \$7363 on loans. Expense was \$669 or less than half of the current income to the bank. Fifty per cent dividends have already been paid in the commercial and savings departments. Cash on hand now te-Income to the Hubbard State

bank totaled \$5253, largely receivrants. Expenses totalled \$573 while interest received was \$425. A 50 per cent savings department dividend has been paid and a total of over 30 per cent paid in dividends on the commercial depart-


