GERVAIS, July 14—The town of Gervais is taking on a lively air at this time. Harold Blake of Portland, who has the contract for hardsurfacing the Pacific highway between Brooks and Hubbard, has leased ground on the Southern Pacific right of way for unloading his materials and is moving his equipment, getting ready to begin work.

He has also leased the lower floor of the Masonic building for his offices. Mr. Blake says he will have work for all available men of Gervais who wish work and that the pay will be 50 cents per hour for 35 hours a week.

An engineer from the state highway department is negotiating for another room in which to establish his office. Gervais was selected as the best location for the equipment because of its unlimited water supply, of which they will use a large amount.

PASTORS' SUPPORT ON PLANT IS ASKED

The Salem Ministerial association does not hold regular meetings during the summer months but called sessions are held as occasion demands. The program committee and the state institutions committee will meet next month to arrange their schedules for the year.

Rev. Fletcher Galloway, president of the association, has sent a communication through the mails to each member, pertaining to the election next week. There had come a request that the pastors of the city cooperate in supporting the measure providing for a sewage disposal plant for the city of Salem. This was referred to the pastors for their individual endorsement together with the argument in its favor. The plan is to go self-liquidating and desirable from the standpoint of sanitation and from the standpoint of employment relief.

The second matter presented in the communication was pertaining to prohibition. Rev. Galloway urged that each member of the association use this final opportunity in again clarifying the issues to be voted upon together with an appeal to the people to "vote sober," and reminding them that "you cannot repeal the effect of alcohol."
