

MAN KIDNAPED DUE TO ERROR

Captors Took him for his Wealthy Employer, is Tale Told Police

his abductors had planned to ask \$50,000 ransom for Wright.
At Albany, N. Y., District Attorney John T. Delaney said the family of John J. O'Connell, Jr., kidnaped scion of a politically powerful democratic clan, had declined to cooperate with him. The uncle and father of the 24 year old national guards officer have intimated that they could not aid officials for fear the kidnapers would carry out threats to slay the young man. Delaney planned a further conference with the O'Connells and said he would ask for all the evidence including four notes from the captors.

At New York, two men who attempted to obtain \$10,000 from Dr. Jacob Wachman, Brooklyn physician under threat of kidnaping were seized in a police trap by use of a decoy package of bills.
Commissioner of Police James P. Allman of Chicago acting with State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney announced formation of a special squad of forty detectives who will act under orders to "shoot to kill at the first resistance" in an effort to stamp out kidnaping. The detectives were commissioned as deputy coroners to give them jurisdiction throughout Cook county. They will travel in special cars, being equipped with machine and riot guns and other arms necessary to combat hoodlums. The squad's first efforts will be directed to find the kidnapers of John Factor, market speculator, who was released Wednesday night after 12 days captivity on payment of \$50,000. The Tushy gang is suspected of the Factor abduction.

Post, who will try for a world solo record as well as attempting to better his own time, will be aided by a robot pilot, designed to keep the plane on its course and maintain its altitude and lateral stability.

The Winnie Mae, weighing more than any ship that ever has left Floyd Bennett field for a transatlantic flight, has a cruising speed of 70 miles an hour with a top of 210 miles. Besides the robot pilot, it carries a new radio compass devised by the United States army and enshrouded in secrecy.

Post planned six stops on his 12,499 mile flight—Berlin, Novosibirsk, Khabarovsk, Fairbanks, Alaska; Edmonton, Alberta, and New York. He has expressed the hope of completing the journey in less than a week.

Sawmills Lower Cut During Past Week, Reported

per cent, and their current sales were over production by 21.55 per cent. Orders booked last week by this group of identical mills were under the preceding week by 42,503,834 feet or 32.21 per cent.

A total of 254 down and operating mills which reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending July 8, produced \$3,343,359 board feet of lumber. This was a decrease of 20,822,800 feet or 27 per cent under their cut of the preceding week. The average week's production of this group of sawmills in 1933 has been 69,443,722 feet; during the same period in 1932, their weekly average was 63,881,489 feet.

The new business reported last week by 182 mills is \$2,445,719 board feet against a production of 73,581,609 feet and shipments of 77,380,679 feet. Their shipments were over their production by 5.16

Oleo Referendum Petitions Cost \$4045, Reported

Circulation of petitions and other expenses in connection with the filing of a referendum attacking the oleomargarine tax law aggregated \$4045, according to a statement filed in the state department here Saturday by the Anti-Food tax league of which Mrs. Alexander Thompson of Portland is president.
The entire fund necessary to defray the cost was contributed by the Best Foods, Inc., and Durkee Famous Foods.
The law under attack provides a tax of four cents a pound on all oleomargarine manufactured and sold in the state of Oregon. It was passed by the 1933 legislature. The referendum will go before the voters at the special election July 21.

TWO MOTORISTS IN 7 ACCIDENTS EACH

Two Oregon motor vehicle operators were involved in 14 traffic accidents during the first six months of 1933. Hal E. Host, secretary of state, reported Saturday. Both drivers are between the ages of 24 and 32 years. Seven accidents were charged against each driver.
The report showed that in 12 cases the drivers were involved in collisions, one crashed with a streetcar, and one was a non-collision accident.
A total of 12,293 persons were involved in traffic accidents during the six months period. Of this number, 1244 of the drivers have been involved in two accidents, 177 have had three accidents, 37 four accidents, seven five accidents, six six accidents and two seven accidents.

Barrier Removed From East Side Road to Portland

The last barriers were removed from the newly constructed Pacific highway pavement between Salem and Portland Saturday when the East Side Super highway from the Clackamas River bridge to Milwaukie, north of Oregon City, was thrown open to traffic.
From Milwaukie the route into Portland is by way of Milwaukie avenue and the Ross Island bridge.

Contractor Blake, who has the contract for widening the Brooks-Woodburn section of the Pacific highway, is installing asphalt tanks near Gervais. Actual construction operations on this highway will get under way Monday.
