## DRUM CORPS GETS HORSE RACE MONEY

Opening day Gate Receipts At Gresham Track Will Net Trip Expenses

Having "gone to the dogs" and come away with a nice profit toward the Chicago convention trip, Capital post drum corps next Friday will go "over horses" — participating in the gate receipts for the opening day of the horse racing season at the Gresham track. J. T. Delaney, financial manager, announced yesterday.

At a meeting of legionnaires and race officials at Portland last Friday, he said, it was agreed that Portland, Salem and other legionnaires would cooperate in selling tickets for the races. William F. Kyns, who will conduct the race meeting at the Multnomah county fairgrounds, consented to donate the entire gate receipts Friday, July 21, to the American Legion Racing association, an organization formed at the conference Friday.

The receipts will be apportioned as follows: First \$600 to send Portland Post No. 1 drum corps to the state convention at Klamath Falls, the next \$200 to Rose City post Glee club for convention expense, and two-thirds of the remainder to the Salem drum corps for its expenses to the national convention at Chicago. The local corps' share is limited to \$6000. Any further proceeds will go to the Multnomah legion county council.

The movement was started by Delaney, who hopes the affair will raise sufficient additional funds to insure the Salem corps' Chicago trip.

## GROWERS-SHIPPERS TIF IS OUTLINED

Oregon fruitgrowers will be interested in the controversy between growers and shippers over the new code for the industry which developed at the meeting in Spokane Thursday. While the growers were not invited they attended anyway; later they separated and each group sent in a proposed code. Each group adopted the name: Northwest Tree Fruit Industries' association.

When the shipper group intimated the 200 Wenatchee growers were not welcome, the growers dared them to "throw us out." They attacked the code and charged "the big shippers have been milking the growers for years and are trying to do it again."

## KECK SHOCKED AT DEATH OF CURATOR

Surprise at the tragedy revealed in the finding of the body of Professor Raymond P. Dougherty of Yale university hanging from a tree limb near New Haven, Conn., Thursday was expressed yesterday by Wendell M. Keck, 1607 State street. Keck, a graduate of Willamette university, became acquainted with Professor Dougherty while studying at Yale to obtain his master of arts degree in 1931. Through an introduction from Ray L. Smith of Salem, who attended Yale with the professor, Keck was a dinner guest of the Dougherty's on Christmas day, 1931, he recalled.

Professor Dougherty, Keck said, had charge of the Yale collection of Babylonian relics, recognized as one of the most complete in the world. Smith and Dougherty lived at the same rooming house as Yale students.

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The C. C. Moore company of Portland will install the boiler and the Gordon-Pinkbeiner company will install the pump.

The bid of the C. C. Moore company was in the amount of \$9985 and was the second lowest proposal submitted. The Gordon-Pinkbeiner bid was \$1425, and was the third lowest proposal.

At the last meeting of the board Governor Meier and Holman were unable to agree on the bids, and all the correspondence, together with the proposals were sent to Hoss who is now at the Dalles. A letter from the state bureau of labor indicated that the low bid for the boiler did not meet with the requirements of the code and that the state boiler inspector would not issue a certificate covering its operation.

The telegram from Hoss read: "Regarding boiler installation and pump purchase I approve recommendations of Engineer Horakotte as he stakes his professional reputation based on careful unprejudiced tests that the state's interests would be best protected thereby. The board employed Horakotte at a substantial salary to handle this job and I have every confidence in his ability and integrity and as a layman in technical engineering our board should support him."

"Regarding pump figures these show that on efficiency basis others would be more expensive if

installed without cost accounting operating charges."

Hoss also recommended the purchase of five Chevrolet automobiles for the state police department on a bid of \$12 higher than submitted by another automobile concern.
