Howard, state superintendent of public instruction; Miss Long, Miss Ann Mulhuron, Portland; Frank Jenkins, Eugene; Earl C. Brough, Sr., Portland; Mrs. Meredith Bailey, Astoria; and W. J. Kerr, chairman of Oregon's higher educational system. Mr. Brough was elected chairman of the board and Mrs. Bailey, vice-chairman.

Bank to be Liquidated — The Glendale State bank, after transferring its unrestricted deposits to the Grants Pass and Josephine County bank, Monday placed its affairs in the hands of A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, for liquidation. The deposits to be liquidated aggregate approximately \$49,000. The bank was organized in 1905 and had capital stock of \$25,000 and surplus of \$5,000. J. M. Thorne of Roseburg, was president of the institution.

SALES TAX WOULD MEAN NO INCREASE

Is Statement Made Monday By Galloway; Property Taxes Delinquent

Adoption of a sales tax at the special election next Friday does not mean that the state will have more money to spend. The state will have the same number of dollars without the sales tax as with it, provided the state shall receive its property taxes in full from the counties. The issue, therefore, is not the property tax and the sales tax but the property tax or the sales tax.

This statement was issued Monday by Charles V. Galloway, state tax commissioner, in refutation of claims made by opponents of the sales tax that the proposed new levy would add materially to the burdens of the property owner and increase the cost of government.

"Delinquent property taxes in Oregon now reach a gross total of approximately \$40,000,000, which is within \$2,000,000 of the total of all taxes charged on all the county rolls of the year 1932," Galloway said. "A graphic picture of the devastating march of property tax delinquency across the state of Oregon is presented in a recent study of a department of the United States forest service."

"This study, made only in Benton, Clatsop, Columbia, Douglas, Lincoln and Tillamook counties, shows that out of some 3,741,000 acres of privately and county owned agricultural, timber and grazing lands therein, 1,642,000 acres, representing 44 per cent of that vast area, are plastered with delinquent taxes which are no more
