The rescue of Jimmy Mattern from the Siberian wilds recalls other famous fliers who have literally "come back from the grave." Harry Hawker was missing six days on his pioneer trans-Atlantic attempt when reported safe aboard a Danish steamer that picked him up. Commander John Rodgers floated for nine days on the Pacific before being rescued following his ill-fated attempt to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu. Don Moyte and Cecil Allen were two more Pacific fliers who had been given up for lost when discovered on an uninhabited island in the Arctic circle. Only last year Stanislaus Hausner, Polish-American flier, floated eight and one-half days before being picked up off the Azores.

FIRST NATIONAL ISSUES STATEMENT

SILVERTON, July 17. — A statement issued of the conditions of the First National bank, which closed August 1, 1932, and which is now being liquidated by Lloyd Kelley, shows the following:

Total assets to be accounted for, \$255,251.49; total cash collected from assets and stock assessments, \$73,042.39; total loss charged off, \$5,348.07; total remaining uncollected assets, \$269,694.34; offsets allowed on assets, \$4,266.69.
Secured and preferred liabilities paid in cash, \$48,056.14; unsecured liabilities offset, \$4497.22; unsecured liabilities for which receiver's certificates have been issued, 150,067.96; unpaid secured liabilities (both proved and unproved), \$40,357.42; unsecured liabilities not paid or proved, \$6858.53; total liabilities accounted for, \$259,474.28.
Total collections accounted for, \$99,590.49. The statement also shows that the expenses of receivership including taxes, insurance and upkeep on the bank building has been \$2143.57. That dividends paid to unsecured creditors has been \$2,065.91, and Reconstruction Finance corporation loans repaid, \$16,500. The cash in hands of receiver and comptroller was July 1, \$4743.54.

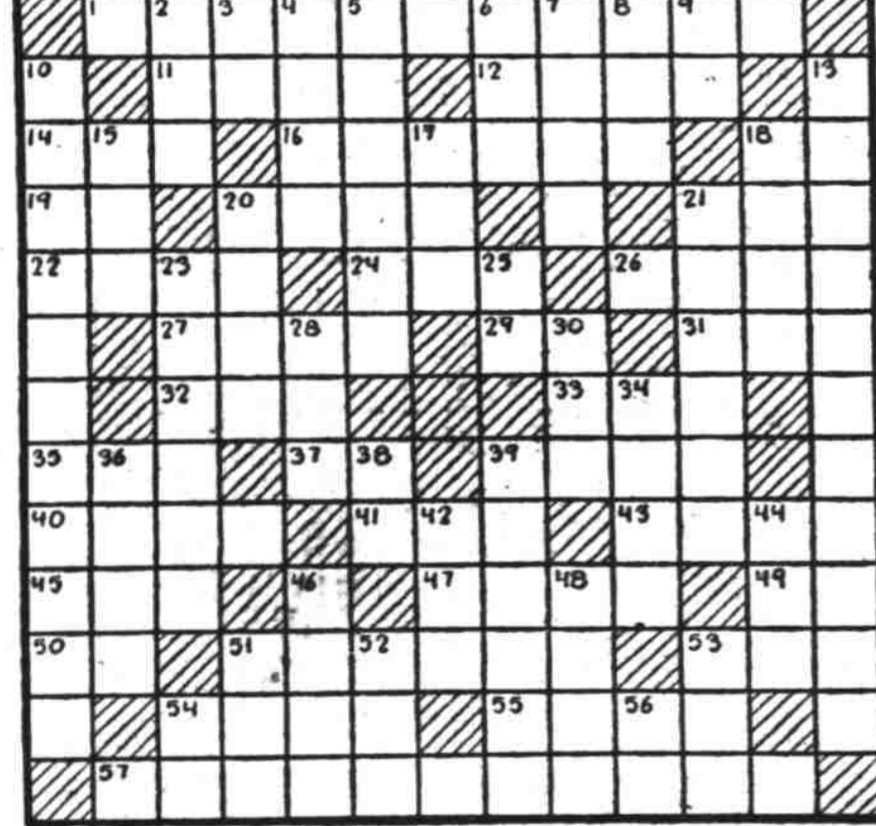
Stream Pollution Subject of Meet Tomorrow Evening

The meeting at which Mr. Moulton will speak will be held in the city park here.
Roy Davenport, chairman of the group representing the various organizations endeavoring to educate the public on the stream pollution situation, will act as chairman of the evening.
The sewage disposal plant, should it be built at Silvertown, will not be a burden to the taxpayer as it will be self liquidating, both in regard to upkeep and interest on the investment, Mr. Davenport explains.

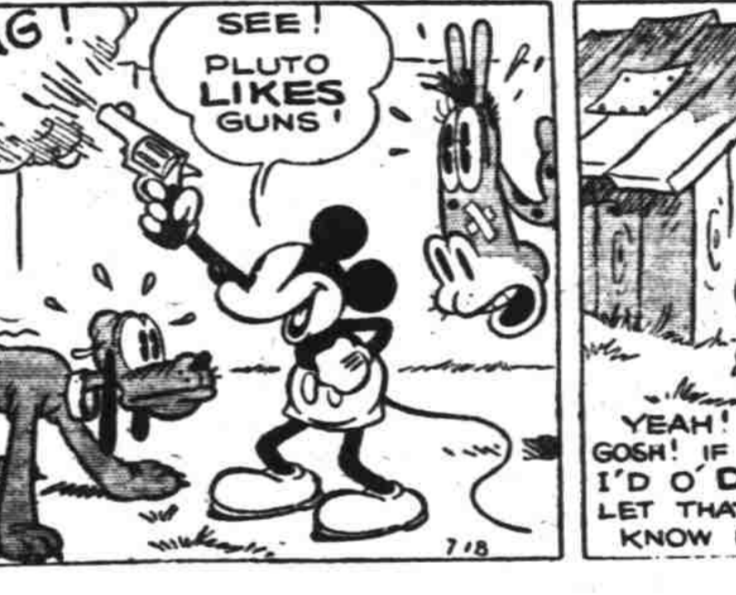
