DEMAND IS ACTIVE FOR RASPBERRIES

Butter Market Tone is Firm; Egg Trade Strong and Country Meats Good

PORTLAND, July 17.—(AP)—Market for butter continued to reflect a very firm tone locally as well as along the coast generally. Production continued to drop in most sections while demand was actually increasing. Butterfat was firm.

Almost general strength was suggested in the egg trade. While prices were not at all uniform on short held storage goods, fresh stock was well held.

Continued heavy shipments of chickens to market were wrecking what was left of a fairly good market. Springers are now weak and lower instead of showing strength as formerly.

Market for country killed meats of all sorts shows a generally firm tone with the possible exception of beef. Veal, hogs and lamb were all moving up promptly at quoted figures.

There was a very active demand for raspberries with prices firm to higher in spots. Loganberries were also in better call with a fair movement of black-caps. Strawberries were nominal.

Very active demand was showing for apricots with California and local stock moving out well at higher prices. The movement was getting under full headway at The Dalles but the season was due to be of record shortness.

Quite fair demand for new apples.

Green and wax beans were still low as were peas.

Celery market was firmly priced; hearts too.

Lettuces of quality was scarce with a movement from the north.

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EGGS, WHEAT GO HIGHER LOCALLY

WHEAT VALUES NEARLY TRIPLED

64 Cents Offered Here On Wheat; Logans And Beans Down

Wheat continued its big climb yesterday, making it four notches higher to an offer of 94 cents both on red and white.

Eggs are up another cent, to 15 cents on mediums, 16 cents on standards and 17 cents on extras. Hogs took no market change yesterday.

String beans are down a half cent to three cents; cabbage is off a cent to one and a half cents per pound; local potatoes are down 25 cents a hundred to \$1.50 and \$1.75; apples are an even dollar a bushel for the Transparents; loganberries bring 10 cents less per crate or 65 cents; and beets, carrots and turnips are all down five cents per dozen bunches to 20 cents.

Professional Traders Overshadowed by Buying Public

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—Enormous sustained public speculative demand stole the grain markets also completely away from professional traders today, and pushed prices to new record peaks. The barley market shot 12 cents skyward.

Wheat was virtually kidnapped by the public, with quotations taken so swiftly aloft that the land-mark price of \$1.25 a bushel was scarcely noticed on the way up, and no halt was possible until a maximum of \$1.77 1/2 was reached, a brand-new gain of 5 1/2 cents to nearly triple the value of wheat at the beginning of 1933.

In the main, the attention of non-professional traders focused on reports of persistent drought, retroactive to spring wheat crop prospects, especially north of the Canadian border.

Most professional traders, alarmed by the rapidity of the market advance, showed a disposition to back away, except to realize profits wholesale, and to point out that wheat for immediate delivery had ceased to follow future deliveries, and that premiums for immediate delivery were as much as 3 cents lower today.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1-1/2 cents below the day's top but 3 1/2-4 cents above Saturday's finish, corn 1/4-2/4 up, oats 1/4-1/2 advanced.

Wool Price Firm Mart Less Active

BOSTON, July 17.—(AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The wool market is less active than a week ago but prices are very firm. Recent sales have been closed on 64s and finer territory wools in original bags at 75 cents accrued basis for average French combing staple and at 77 cents for good French combing. Receipts of domestic wool at Boston during the week ending July 15, estimated by the Boston Grain and Flour Exchange, amounted to 13,682,000 pounds as compared with 9,052,000 during the previous week.
