NEW LITIGATION ON CITY WATER LIKELY

Water Company not to Push Court Test if Purchase Basis Arrived at

More litigation over the December 15, 1931, City of Salem authorization of \$2,500,000 water purchase bonds impends despite the state supreme court's recent ruling, counsel for the Oregon Washington Water Service company indicated Friday. However, the litigation would not be carried on, it was pointed out, if water company officials and the Salem city council can arrive at a satisfactory purchase basis for the plant here.

Counsel for the water company said the supreme court's decision was only on the demurrer made by the water company to the declaratory judgment proceedings brought by the city. The circuit court here and the supreme court sustained the declaratory judgment method of procedure. However, the case may be raised now on its merits.

Walter E. Keyes said the supreme court's mandate is complied with the circuit clerk here. He now has ten days to prepare an answer to the city's complaint on merits and Keyes said yesterday he was working on such an answer.

The company does not wish to appear to be threatening litigation to force an agreement on terms. However, it will continue to test the charter amendment bond authority unless a satisfactory deal is made.

Proper Grade and Curves Required Hereafter, Roads

All roads hereafter constructed in the state of Oregon must have proper grades and curvatures, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, declared Friday.

"The motorist demands what are known as fast roads," Baldock said, "rather than those having a scenic value. This means that all unnecessary curves must be eliminated."

BONUS COMMISSION CAMPAIGN SUCCESS

The campaign launched recently by the world war veterans state aid commission to dispose of all repossessed properties and restore the mt the tax rolls, has proved more successful than originally anticipated, Jerrold Owen, secretary, declared Friday.

More than 25 sales of these properties were closed during the last two weeks at prices satisfactory to both the purchasers and the commission. In virtually all cases the appraisals of the commission were acceptable.

The records show that the bonus commission has approximately 1125 repossessed properties. Total of 748 of these properties are located in incorporated towns and cities and are rented. The state's investment in these properties aggregates \$1,648,583.

Farm properties number 379, of which 215 are leased and returning small revenue to the commission. The state's investment in these properties is approximately \$922,973.

RIPE PEAS ARE WEEVIL SPREADERS

Every patch of garden peas left to ripen and to shatter seed after the peas are no longer suitable for the table, will become a hatchery for next year's pea weevils, A. O. Larson, federal entomologist of Oregon State college experiment station, warns.

As nearly every gardener knows, the weevils have been exceptionally abundant in gardens this year, possibly because there were fewer field peas for them to infest. The result has been that late season peas have been so badly infested as to affect their market value, he says.

In many patches practically every pea has been infested, which means even a short row left to ripen may liberate a thousand or more adult weevils later. Pulling the vines and feeding them at once, or plowing them under, or even burning them will destroy all the larvae. One can save enough seed if this seed is fumigated as soon as harvested — otherwise it will be worthless anyway.

So far science has found no way

to combat this pest except by getting rid of the adults by preventing their development. Community cooperation on cleanup of pea vines is the only method yet found worthy of recommendation.
