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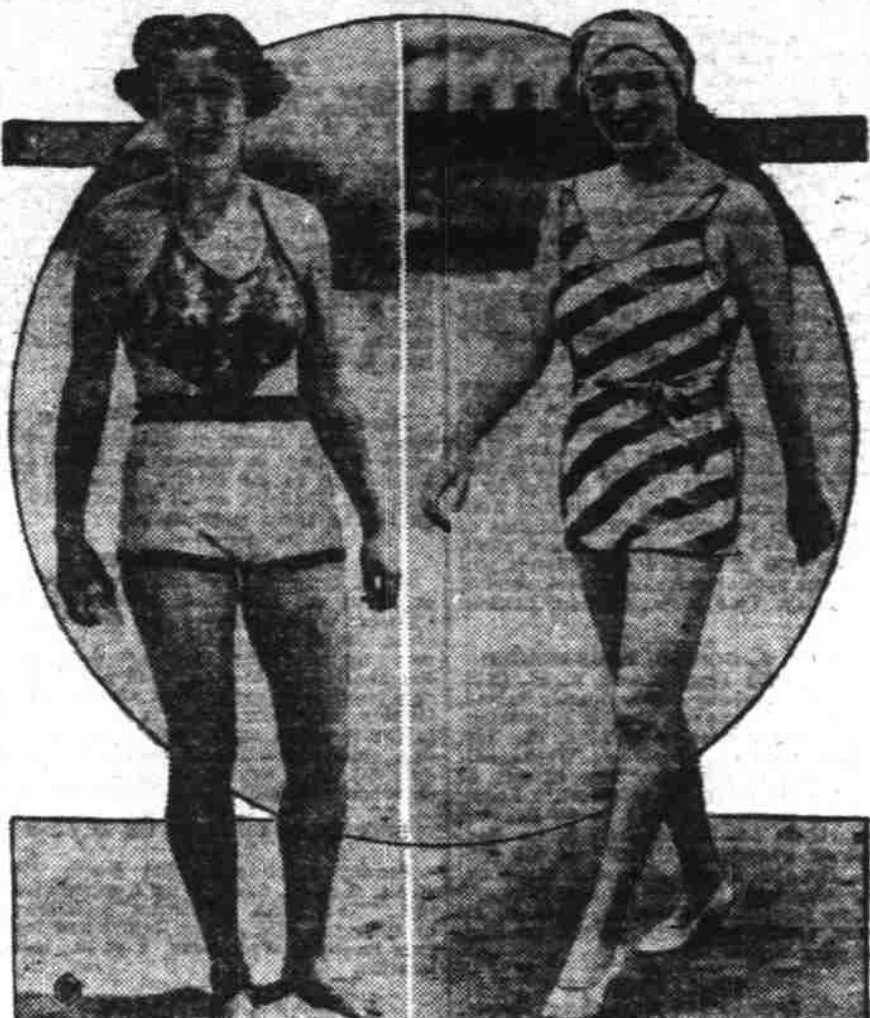

OFFICIALS ADVISED PAY CUTS ILLEGAL

BEND, Ore., July 21. — (AP) — On the basis of a circuit court opinion handed down in Malheur county this week by Judge W. W. Wood, two Deschutes county officials said today that they plan to make no further recognition of the 1933 legislative act reducing their salaries.

P. B. Johnson, county clerk, and Walter G. Peak, county treasurer, said they would put themselves back on the payroll at the rate their offices paid before the legislature acted and that they would also seek payment of the amount already taken off. The law went into effect June 6. Johnson's salary was cut from \$2,000 to \$1,600 and Peak's from \$1,500 to \$1,000.

Judge Wood held that the act reducing the salaries of certain Malheur county officials does not apply to individuals holding office at the time the act was passed.

\$32,000 PAID OUT AT WOODBURN PLANT

WOODBURN, July 21. — Checks totalling \$32,000 were paid at the Ray-Brown cannery here Friday afternoon. Of this amount \$12,000 was paid for labor of the first fifteen days in July. The remaining \$20,000 was paid to local fruit growers. The \$20,000 represents only fruit bought in this immediate vicinity. Much fruit was also bought in The Dalles, Yakima, Albany, Gresham and Eugene.

Work at the cannery will slow up considerably from now on. The last shipments of cherries from The Dalles and Yakima were received last Friday but the local Royal Annes and black cherries are still being received.

It is expected that all loganberries and raspberries will be finished by the end of this week or the early part of next week.

After a short lull the cannery plans to begin its longest run, the pear packing. The season will probably start about the last week or two in August and last several months.
