FAVOR BONNEVILLE SITE ON COLUMBIA

PORTLAND, July 21.—(AP)—A recommendation favoring the Bonneville site 50 miles up-river from Portland for the proposed \$43,000,000 navigation-power dam on the Columbia river, was received here Thursday from the United States division engineer's office in San Francisco.

Colonel Thomas M. Robins, in charge of the office, estimated the dam's hydro-electric facilities would produce 430,000 kilowatts, equivalent to 500,000 horsepower. Suitable locks would be provided for river navigation and transportation.

Congressman Charles H. Martin said of the proposed dam: "I consider the contemplated river development virtually assured now. President Roosevelt has indicated time and time again his friendliness toward the river program."

The Bonneville dam would be the first of a series to be included in a vast program of Columbia river development.

With a number of fast men in the lineup, Bashor believes more aggressive base running can be executed. Scales, Wood, Garbarino and Pemberton are particularly fast men, and all slide well.

While Wilson held Schapp's in check before, he will face a tougher row of hitters Sunday. A full hour was devoted to infield practice yesterday with each man extending the amount of territory covered. The combination of Wood on short and Garbarino on second worked particularly well on double plays.

GLADWIN, Iowa, July 21.—(AP)—Three of four transients killed today when the oil car on which they were riding was derailed and exploded setting fire to other freight cars were identified as Kenneth Bewak, Doland Bonde and Joe McKenney, all of Dewey, Oklahoma.

Big Forest Fire In Idaho Is Not Yet Controlled

BOISE, July 21.—(AP)—The largest fire of the season was burning last night over more than 300 acres of Idaho national forest timber on Dillinger creek in Chamberlain basin. The fire was apparently not under control after three days, according to reports received here.

Outfits to equip 100 men were sent from Boise forest warehouses here. A crew to clear a fire trail around the burning area was ordered by E. Scribner, Idaho forest supervisor. The forest force is augmented by platoons from several civilian conservation camps.

Yank Tennis Squad Faces Elimination

AUTEUIL, France, July 21.—(AP)—England's Davis cup team, which the Americans had considered less of a menace than Australia, started the tennis world today by overwhelming the twin hopes or the United States. Ellsworth Vines and Wilmer Allison, in the first two singles matches of the inter-zone finals.

Dapper, 26-year-old Henry Wilfred "Bunny" Austin, a juvenile figure in sports, trounced the great Vines, American champion, with machine-like ease, 6-1, 6-1, 6-4, and then Frederick J. Perry, the British No. 1 star, made almost as short work of Allison, 6-1, 7-5, 6-4.

Thus the Americans saw their hopes all but crushed with two setbacks as swift and decisive as they were surprising. It was the most bitter Davis cup pill the Americans have had to swallow since they lost the famous trophy at Germantown in 1927, particularly as this year's invasion was considered one of the best equipped to take the cup back to the U. S. A.

With a 2-0 lead in the series of five matches, England needs only one more victory to settle the issue, whereas the United States now faces the terrific uphill assignment of taking three matches in a row, to avert elimination.

The burden of keeping America in the fight is strictly up to John Van Rye and George Martin Lott, Jr., the doubles combination. If they can win tomorrow, there will remain the chance for Vines and Allison to redeem themselves in the concluding singles matches Sunday, against Perry and Austin, respectively.
