DEVELOPMENT SEEN FOR LESLIE FIELD

Three Tennis Courts Being Constructed; Plans are Outlined by Dr. Pound

Construction during the coming year of three tennis courts on the grounds of Leslie junior high school will be merely the beginning of scheduled improvements designed to make the 13 acres which surround the building one of the best equipped playgrounds for both adult and young people in the northwest. This is the opinion of Dr. B. F. Pound, chairman of the building and grounds committee of the Salem school board, and of Dr. David Bennett Hill, chairman of the tennis courts committee of the South Salem Parent-Teachers' association under whose auspices two of the three projected courts are now being graded.

One dirt court will be completed and in use sometime in October according to present calculations. Another will be cemented late this fall. Money for construction of the courts is being furnished by the South Salem Parent-Teachers' association and by a special fund raised by Leslie students.

County relief lists were tapped for money that employment might be given where it would be needed and so that as much work as possible might be done with the money at hand.

No definite rulings have been made as to the use of the courts but Dr. Hill said last night that when the courts were ready for use, regulations, beneficial to both the public and the student group helping to make the courts possible, would be announced.

The grounds now have two well-plotted ball diamonds and the abundance of shade trees there is conducive to other outdoor sports. The supervised playgrounds for the southern portion of the city is now located at Lincoln school, but there is a movement on foot to have it transferred to the more spacious, better equipped Leslie grounds next season.

TRIBUTE IS PAID TO W. S. LEVENS

Memorial services for the late William S. Levens, assistant attorney general, who died suddenly at Eugene while prosecuting L. A. Banks for murder, were held in the state supreme court chambers Tuesday.

A formal resolution paying tribute to Mr. Levens was presented by Miles McKee, a member of the attorney general's staff. The resolution was drafted by the Marion County Bar association.

The eulogy was given by John H. Carson. Other speakers included Chief Justice Rand of the state supreme court; Attorney General Van Winkle and Circuit Judges L. H. McMahan and L. G. Lewelling.

Mr. Levens served as assistant attorney general for four years. He previously was state prohibition commissioner.

Pulse is Grown West of River; Seed Imported

Samples of pulse, a pea-like legume grown from imported seed, were brought to The Statesman office recently by Mrs. M. Allen who lives on Wallace road. Cooked like peas, this odd vegetable has a nut-like flavor, she said.

In shape the pulse pods resemble those of peas but they average only an inch and a half in length and are covered with a fine down. The seed is knarled more in the fashion of a hazel nut than of a pea.

BOARD OF CONTROL TAKES QUEER TURN

Operations of the state board of control apparently took a new turn here Monday. Instead of holding the regular meeting of the board, William Einzig, state purchasing agent, first conferred with Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, and later held a brief meeting with Governor Meier. Proposals considered separately by members of the board Monday will come up for final approval at the next meeting. Hal E. Hess, secretary of state, is at The Dalles and was not in attendance at Monday's sessions.

Holman announced that he had refused to approve several recommendations of the state purchasing agent. Governor Meier and Holman agreed on sending Einzig to New York where he will contact buyers in hope of moving approximately \$75,000 worth of flax now on hand at the state penitentiary. Expenses covering the trip were tentatively approved.

Other matters considered, subject to approval by the board at a subsequent meeting, included the purchase of 24 motor vehicles. Einzig recommended that these cars be purchased from the low bidders. Four automobiles will go to the world war veterans state aid commission and 10 to the state highway department. The highway department also seeks 10 light trucks.

The individual conferences lasted less than 10 minutes each.

Marion County's C.C.C. Recruits Record is Good

An excellent report on conditions for and behavior of 124 Marion county boys in the C. C. C. camp near Prineville is brought here by recent visitors to that section. The camp is in the Ochoco forest 65 miles from Prineville. OIL COOPERATIVE IS INCORPORATED

Grange Sponsors Scheme to Save on Purchases For Farmers' Benefit

A cooperative oil association open to all farmers was incorporated here Tuesday following a final meeting at the chamber of commerce of the incorporators. It will be known as the Valley Farmers' Cooperative Oil association and has a capital stock of \$10,000, with 1000 shares at \$10 each.

Two hundred shares will be preferred stock and 800 common stock, with the common stock to be held only by cooperative associations dealing in agricultural products or by producers of agricultural products.

The association is sponsored by the Grange, but membership is open to all farmers. The incorporators have been working on the project for the past 11 months, with articles filed with the county clerk yesterday following the meeting here.

Headquarters will be at Woodburn pending decision on a permanent location by the board of directors, when elected. T. R. Hobart of Silverton is secretary. Incorporators are: F. W. Mahony, St. Paul; George S. Berg, Barlow; G. D. Brown, T. R. Hobart and Oscar Lee, all of Silverton; Ray J. Glat of Woodburn; and A. J. Mader of Macleay.

While the primary purpose of the association is to handle oil and petroleum products, articles provide that anything used on the farm may be handled.

Philharmonists' Crowds Larger Than Expected

Larger crowds than expected have heard the Willamette Philharmonic choir on its trip east to Chicago Dean Frank M. This act appropriates money for the establishment of employment agencies, contingent upon a matching agreement by the states. Gram said he had placed the plan before Governor Meier. Gram expressed the opinion that seven or eight employment offices in Oregon would be sufficient. Funds to match the federal appropriation would be furnished by the counties and municipalities.

UNIFORM ENTRANCE BLANKS ADVOCATED

Registrars of 14 colleges, universities and junior colleges in Oregon, conferred here Monday with C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, with relation to the adoption of uniform college entrance blanks.

A proposal to furnish the state superintendent of schools with information concerning comparative work of students in each high school also was considered. This information would be confidential, Howard said, and would be used for constructive work in the various schools.

Howard declared that Oregon's higher educational institutions are very liberal in entrance requirements, and that Oregon was one of the few states in which the colleges and universities do not dominate high school curricula.
