

DISPOSAL PLAN NOW LAUNCHED

Mayor Garver of Silverton
Will Select Committee
To Order Surveys

SILVERTON, July 26.—At a special meeting of the city council held Tuesday night Mayor Garver was empowered with a committee he will select to negotiate with proper authorities and to make all preliminary plans, including surveys, for the sewage disposal plant at Silverton.

Mayor Garver explained that the state board of engineers will be allowed \$200 by the government for the survey of Silverton. Final plans and specifications must be adopted by the city council before they are passed upon by the state board. If this board passes them they are then sent to the R. F. C. The mayor and his committee will also negotiate for the purchase or lease of land on which to build the plant. Portland engineering companies have banded together. It was said at the meeting, to handle the surveying as it can be done much cheaper in this manner.

The matter of placing the county portable cannery when it comes to Silverton was also disposed of at this meeting. Council thought that the cannery would be best situated near the park so that children accompanying their mothers when the latter bring material to be canned, will have a place to play. It was explained that when the seed was distributed last spring it was understood that some of the stuff grown would be canned for winter use and a certain percentage of the canned goods is to go to the local welfare work.

The material to be canned is to be brought completely prepared for canning. The portable cannery has a capacity of about 2000 cans a day. Registration for canning will commence Saturday and the cannery plans to come to Silverton first.

Mr. and Mrs. George Weiler are the parents of a son, born Monday morning. This is the second son and fifth child.

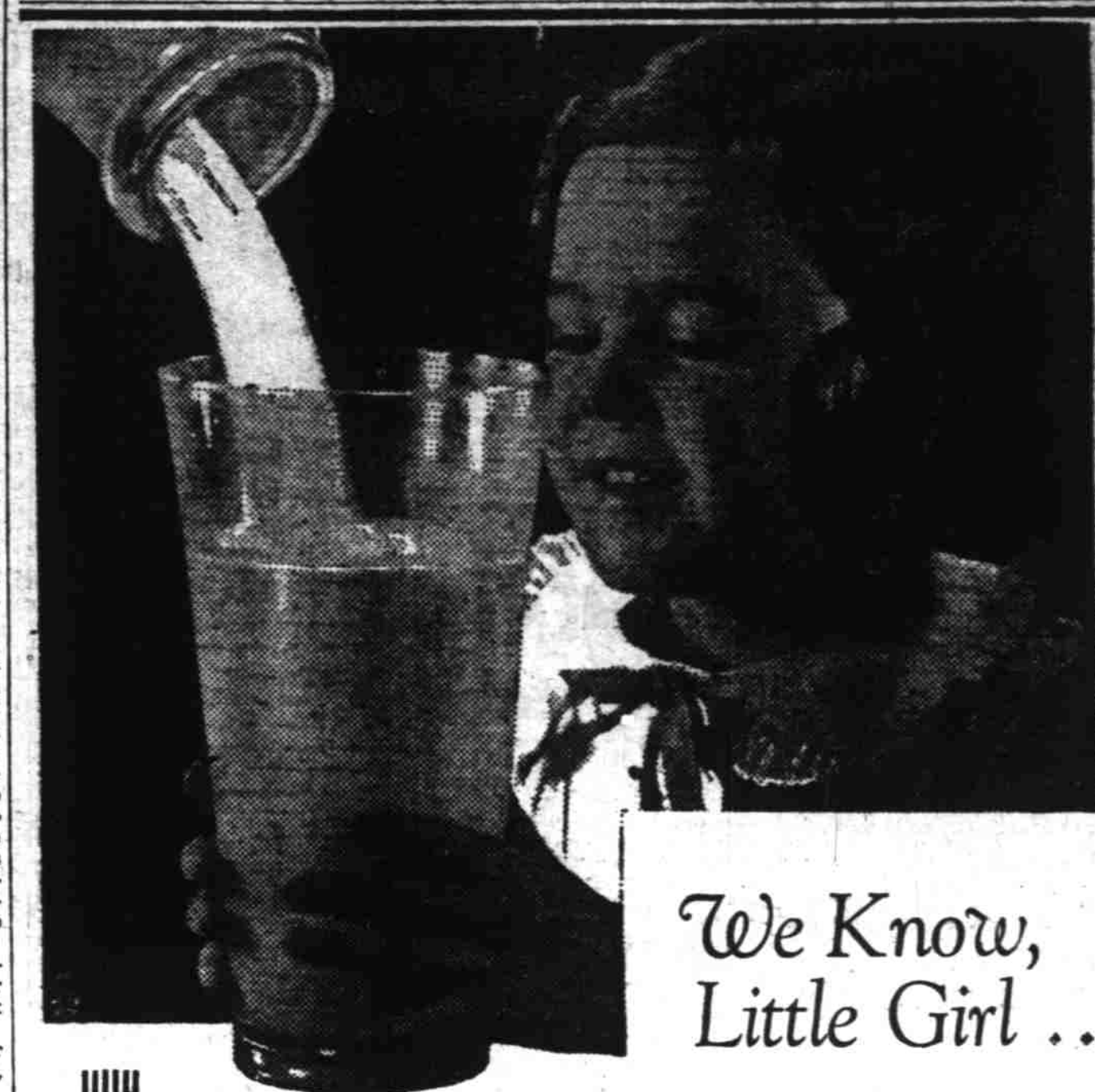
