

NEW ARENA TO OPEN TONIGHT

West Salem mat Pavilion Unique; Three Main Events Offered

Across Brooklyn bridge from New York city, somewhere out on Long Island, is situated Madison Square Garden stadium. West Salem, somewhat inclined at present to call itself Kingwood as a means of expressing its individual entity apart from Salem, is also, right now, priding itself on being like Brooklyn in that it has an open air arena built exclusively for wrestling and boxing, the only one, it is claimed, in Oregon.

It is in truth a unique structure. From the outside it appears small, and the visitor on approaching it wonders how the West Salem legionnaires, who built it, expect to get crowds inside it sufficient to pay the freight on high class wrestling shows. That is no longer a mystery when it is viewed from the inside. Tiers of seats slope up sharply on

all four sides of the ring, utilizing every inch of space with the result that spectators on the top-most tier will be virtually "ring-siders."

This newly completed arena will be opened for public inspection and the initial wrestling show tonight, with a triple main event consisting of one - hour bouts offered by the legion post, with Herb Owen as matchmaker. Mickey McGuire whose residence is at West Salem, will meet Bulldog Jackson of Klamath Falls, in one of these bouts; Logger Helbert of St. Helens, and Dorry Detton of Salt Lake City, will figure in another; Tesura Higami of Jaan, and John Nemanic of St. Louis, in the third. True to the modern trend toward the collegiate atmosphere in wrestling, two of the men are recent college men; Detton of University of Utah, Nemanic from University of Colorado.
