GRAND COULEE DAM APPROVED, IS WORD

WASHINGTON, July 27—(AP)—The public works board was reported tonight to have approved construction of the Grand Coulee dam in the Columbia river in Washington and start the huge Columbia basin reclamation development.

The board was understood to have hurried action on the \$60,000,000 project at the specific request of President Roosevelt.

Senator Dill (D., Wash.), has been conferring with the president and the public works board this week and he hailed the Grand Coulee dam approval tonight as the beginning of a vast development of the northwest territory.

The dam is to be 145 feet high and will be so constructed that a super dam to rise to 370 feet may be erected upon it later.

No irrigation is to be provided by the 145 foot wall and the dam will be devoted to power development.
